







There wasn't much adjustment required. I wasn't in any mainstream courses, and I only took classes with other Americans. The teachers were still Russian, but they were used to working with foreigners.	
I adapted as best as I was able to Russia's rather strange educational system. I now have a much better appreciation for the quality of education I am receiving at my own university. I did infact learn a great deal about effective studying and even teaching mechanisms while studying abroad however	
I had a difficult time adjusting to the different educational system. The informality of the system made it very difficult for me to enjoy my classes. I feel that most of my learning came from living with a host family, not from the classroom.	
The most marked difference I noticed between the Russian and American educational environments was the lack of critical and analytical thinking expected at our Russian university. Most of the work we were assigned was simple and formulaic--even writing papers largely involved stating the facts. That's not to say that this style of learning was ineffective for learning Russian; it's more that it just got frustrating occasionally. The work load was challenging, just not intellectually stimulating.	
The Russian educational system places much more authority on the professors, although in the Middlebury classes with other Americans we were encouraged to speak very often, of course, seeing as how we needed to practice oral interaction. In my mainstream classes I noticed that perhaps the local students did not work as consistently at their studies throughout the semester-many students only came for the final classes. There was almost no homework--all depended on the final exams. I think that in my case, homework would have been a plus, because my mainstream professors often gave me an inflated grade because I was a foreigner. I believe that my listening skills improved, not just in Russian but in all languages, by the length of lectures that I listened to and very actively took notes on.	
Considering that I only took courses specifically designed for foreign students, I don't believe I was given a true means of comparison between the two academic environments, and I feel that the greater influence on my personal learning was the city environment and the national culture.	
Well, if you suck at the language it's going to suck to be you in the country, the academic environment is difficult to deal with	
The class sizes were very small (2-3 people) which was very helpful but there was a lot of busy work that seemed unnecessary and tedious.	
My class was three students, which was great but definitely forced you to participate. More relaxed, but still hard. It was just a different way of learning, like when youre a kid and just learning how to speak and how the world works.	
Midd was good at making a lot of the classes similar to those in the states. Some classes were different in that it was more about doing exactly what the teacher said versus being creative. There was a lot more lecturing and writing down word for word what the teacher said. I benefited in that I learned about different teaching styles and learning that I do better in an interactive learning environment.	
I felt that Russia's educational system was detrimental to to my learning, in almost every way. Students didn't apply themselves and appeared bored and unresponsive in class, but this was often because professors themselves were monotonous and seemed unwilling to put forth any effort. I quickly became bored, unwilling to do my work, and it sullied my general outlook which is usually so brightly colored by exciting new knowledge. It DID teach me to appreciate my own educational system, howeer.

I was already aware of a lot of differences, but knowing about them and experiencing them are completely different. Now I know how I react, how I cope, and what advice I can offer other people in my position.	
I knew next to nothing about Russia before arriving. Now I feel as if I am truly qualified to tell outsiders a bit about the culture, not just the language.	
Americans enjoy more social freedoms and independent thought. There is more unexplained violence and hatred in Russia, which was very upsetting to witness.	
I think that after spending a semester in Russia, it's hard to stereotype Russian or American cultures.	
What can I say? Russia is still a mystery to me. It's not Europe, it's not Asia. To say that Russians and Americans are the same would be naive. But we all have similar hopes, I guess. Ask me again later.	
My views stayed the same. The material and urban cultures have stark similarities but are just different enough to mean that Russia and the US won't understand each other fully for many years to come.	
Who the hell cares? Honestly, Russia is different than the states...big deal, i coulda told you that before i went. They don't care so much about this asinine self-evaluative bullshit	
Life in russia seemed heavier than in the US but i really enjoyed my time there.	
We were not really integrated that well into the university, so I cannot comment too much.	
There are definite differences, but I found lots of similarities too. Ultimately, they are people too. People tend to focus a lot on the differences, but getting to know people of a different culture really shows similarities.	
Russia's culture aptly resembles its literature: dark, complicated, trying to get messages about life across - between the lines - to the careful observer and occasionally succeeding, and with bright moments of light flashing through. With the exception of their openness about their corruption, American culture seems much more transparent and accepting of new ideas. Plus, the streets are cleaner and people drink less- both good things.

<p>I had never really experienced another culture to this extent before leaving the us for this year. Now I feel as if I am a completely different person, with much more concrete views about cultures in general as opposed to vague idealism</p>	
<p>I have started to understand the diversity of the Russian spirit and its complexities in modern day Russia. My appreciation and love for America has exponentially grown since studying abroad in Russia.</p>	
<p>Study abroad greatly increased my understanding of Russian culture, and has made me in some ways appreciate American culture and in others be ashamed of it.</p>	
<p>I think that my town and my host family gave me a good idea of how/why "average" Russians live. I love the staff at Middlebury, but the views of highly educated emigres simply do not represent the majority of Russians, just like I am not an average American in many ways.</p> <p>I learned a lot of things that are good about Americans, and a lot of things that now I see as bad. I think I saw aspects of American culture, i.e. knee-jerk patriotism, reflected in their Russian counterparts, although I didn't notice it as much in America. I suppose I am a bit more sensitive to American nationalism, if such a nationality exists, because of my observations of Russian nationalism.</p> <p>It's very difficult to summarize all the things I learned about Russia and Russians, but I feel like I can finally say some things with some authority now that I have lived there, even if for a while.</p>	
<p>Living in Moscow for four months made me resentful of Russian nosiness and flagrant disregard of personal space. It changed nothing of my perception of America any more than my growing up in Africa did.</p>	
<p>I don't know what this means. American culture is by and large superior to the Russian as it tends to permit fewer prejudices. Russian culture is Russian culture experience it for yourself</p>	
<p>I studied abroad in Latvia in high school and I thought I was familiar with the culture but they are completely different. I think knowing some of the language was very helpful in integrating into the culture and Middlebury's program really inforced the language.</p>	
<p>Absolutely! But in the end, people are just people. (an invaluable insight, in my opinion)</p>	
<p>I learned that there aren't right or wrong cultural ideas. They just are. It makes me question some aspects of American culture and love more other aspects of American culture.</p>	
<p>My study abroad cemented my suspicions about Russia's culture - difficult, but rewarding, to navigate, with Soviet mindset still dramatically influencing outlook. From the Russian perspective, America looked more threatening than I had ever thought it before, a menacing presence in the West waving a hypocritical banner of peace. I could see how Russia was interpreting our actions as being something other than we intended, and that was very interesting.</p>

I convinced myself that I can indeed live on my own. I can survive in a foreign clime, aand that is a huge confidence builder. Other than that, it is difficult to measure the immense amount of personal growth for me that took place while abroad	
I am more in tune with my emotional state and act accordingly.	
I really learned how to adapt to new and unexpected situations. In Russia, when something goes wrong, most of the time you don't have a lot of power to control the situation, and you have to be ok with that. Really, I learned to just laugh at times when I once would have been frustrated.	
<p>I think I have become more confident, and maybe a little more serious. I spent a fair amount of time alone and I feel more secure, if that makes any sense.</p> <p>I worry too much about standing out and find it very difficult to take risks, especially when meeting people. These traits, of course, are not conducive to study abroad, but I am also very easy-going and tolerant of various people/ideas/conditions, so I think this made up for part of my aforementioned shortcomings.</p>	
It did not contribute to my personal growth, if anything I regressed.	
My self-reliance...if I didn't want to deal with something I could just wait it out and get by	
I learned that I can sustain myself in a different culture speaking a foreign language. I am very independent and motivated and that really helped me during study abroad.

I definitely learned a lot about myself when I studied abroad. I found that I can live on my own if necessary. I really developed into an adult. Mental strength was crucial to my time abroad.

I have been scolded for wet hair, ordered to eat my salad, and realized babushki are the most powerful people in Russia.	
My host mom was an invaluable resource	
My host family was the best part of my study abroad experience. I learned so much about the language, the culture, and the people.	
I really enjoyed living with a family during my time in Russia, but in the end I had a lot less interaction with them than I expected. I very much appreciated the independence I was given, and I definitely felt close with my host mom; I just didn't feel entirely part of the family. My independence, however, allowed me to cultivate relationships and spend more time with my Russian friends outside my family.	
I am very glad I did a homestay, if I had lived in a dorm I would have only learned about student life, which is atypical of the way most people live in every country.	
Homestays are a terrible idea, especially in Moscow. Most families are just doing it for the money and openly resent the presence of strangers in their house, as well as their financial dependence on them. Because of this, I avoided contact with my homestay and thus gained very little culturally and linguistically. I would have been far more integrated if I had been living in the dormitory at RGGU and had the opportunity to mix with Russian students who are more open to interacting with foreigners.	
Learn to live your life, if your living situation doesn't jive with your goals get over it and stop being such a wimp	
I lived with an 80 year old woman so I did not interact with a family or the younger generation but I learned a lot about life in the ussr.	
Spoke Russian all the time, learnt more than I wanted to know about Russian families.	
It was very helpful, but it was also isolating. My host mom was very self-focused emotionally. I can now understand a lot better than before, but I didn't get a real chance to speak.	
Like all of the students in Russia, I lived with a host-grandmother. It was fairly predictable: she was a wealth of information about Soviet life, traditional Russian ritual, and native foods, which was wonderful. However, she lived alone and seemed to have little understanding of how my generation live, what they think, and how to gain access to them. I got that aspect through other areas of my stay abroad, so I appreciate the history I received through my home-stay.

After a month or two of history, I suddenly realized I could read.

It is day and night. Now I can confidently joke, talk and interact with Russians at a very high speed with out slip up

I improved greatly, as much as I had hoped to. I think this was in part due to the homestay, as well as the language pledge. But i also made a point to study the language.

At the beginning of the semester, I was frustrated because I didn't think I was progressing as fast as I wanted. But by the end of my time there, I realized how much I had learned, and how proficient I had really become. I really think that the language pledge was a big part of this, especially in the academic environment.

It is hard to notice how much I improved, I think that I was perhaps expecting more-- people back home ask me "are you fluent?", and I can't honestly answer that I am. But that being said, I know that I improved a great deal and am at least conversational now. I think it was most helpful in acquiring natural speech patterns, getting a feel for the language, and in listening comprehension.

I made very little progress in my Russian. I attribute this to my initial bad homestay and the resentment and isolation I experienced as a result of the language pledge.

Didn't have anything to do with middlebury (except in Irkutsk) just being in Russia will develop your Russian skills don't be ridiculous, Irkutsk is great because wimps don't go there

I thought my progress would be greater but I also did not stick to the language pledge 100%. A lot of the classes such as speaking class and writing class did little to improve the targeted skills. Life and other classes and activities helped more than the classes.

Im very happy with my progress, sticking to the language pledge (almost) all the time was crucial factor to that I believe. Start straight away on the way to the airport in Moscow was scary, but set the standard.

I learned a lot, but not as much as I thought I would. I mean, I learned more than I expected, but in a different way. I did the Midd summer program, so I had to compare my abroad time to that. I suggest that people spend time with the local youth as much as they can.

I improved less than I expected. I don't think you can improve as much as you would like when you're in classes with other American students that happen to be taught in Russian; opportunities to study with Russian students were available, but I found the approach to them discouraging. I don't think you can put us together in classes all day long and expect that we're not going to bond together before we seek out the company of the rather stand-offish Russian students.

Firstly, the mandatory homestay needs to be scrapped, and students should be given the option of staying in the dormitory. As I have said previously, most host families in Moscow are doing it for the money and this creates a very isolating and in some cases oppressive living situation. If one is avoiding one's host family, then one is not immersed in the local culture which I assume is the point of the homestay. If Middlebury wants its students to be truly immersed, it should allow them the option of living in the dormitory where they can meet and interact with and befriend Russian students, thereby giving them an emotional imperative to improve their language skills. Those students that made Russian friends through contacts in the dormitory improved their Russian far more greatly than those who simply interacted with their homestay.</p> <p>I would also not recommend this program because of the language pledge. Although seemingly a good idea in theory, it soon became abundantly clear to me that the pledge does not actually help improve one's language skills. You can't actually improve your Russian when everyone around you is at the same level. You all wind up making the same mistakes without anyone to correct you. Also, considering the fact that for the most part, our Russian was intermediate meant that we were the exact same mind-numbing conversation every single day, which meant that nobody in the group could get close to each other. This sort of repetitiveness only appeals to boring, single-minded people, and it did. The sacred language pledge gave a moral imperative to the only two people in our group who followed it, which caused great amounts of tension on group trips and made the co-ordinator's job a lot harder. These people sat at home every night, buried in their books and did not interact much with the locals. These two people made less progress than those who spoke English with each other and went out there and made Russian friends. I heard similar stories from the students in Yaroslavl. Middlebury should spend less money and effort upholding a silly ideal that anyone with a dynamic personality will break anyway and instead focus more on integrating its students with young Russians, because this will help their Russian far more than speaking mediocre Russian amongst themselves.</p> <p>Until these two things change, I would not recommend this program, because they greatly hinder the learning and integration processes and cause a great amount of unnecessary frustration.</p>
