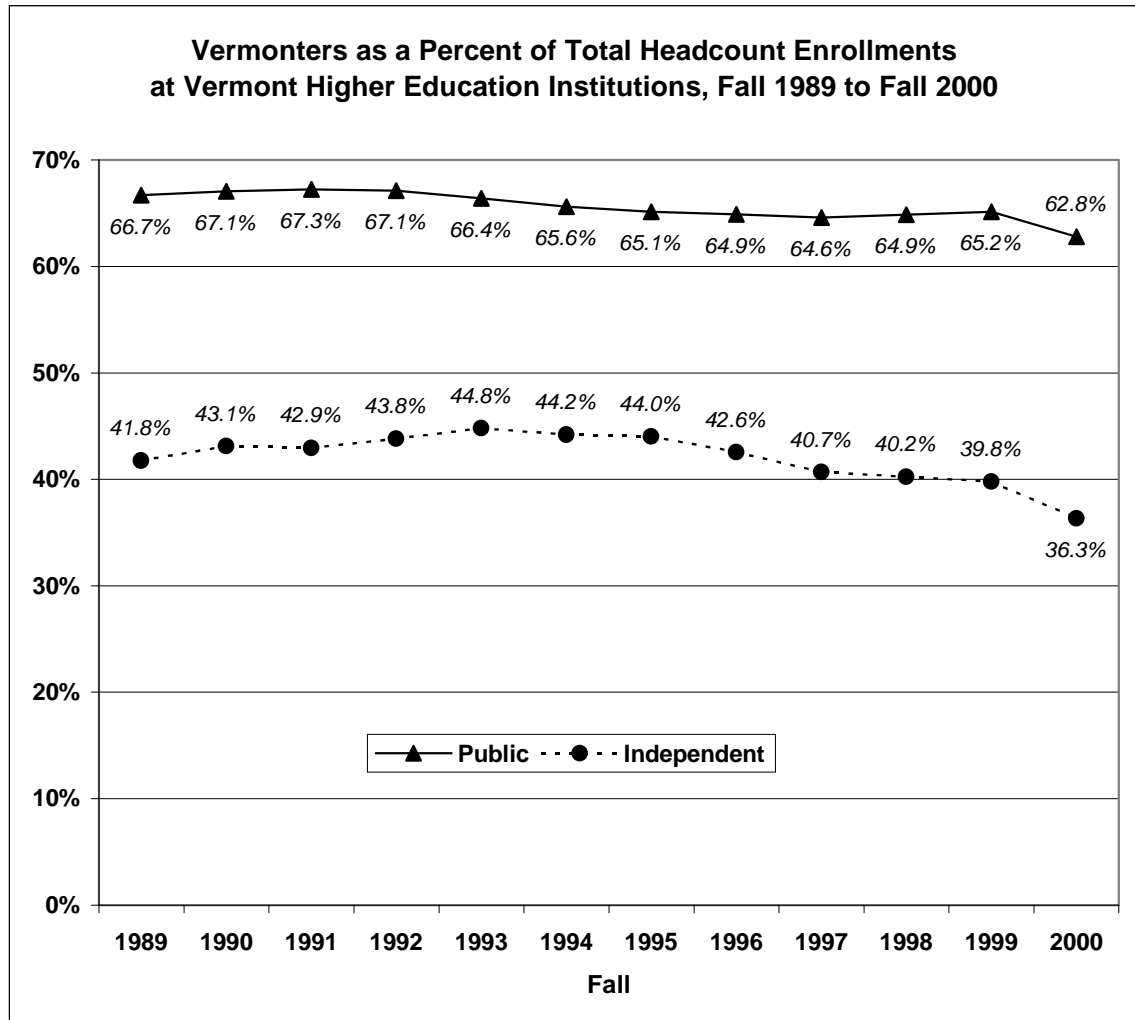

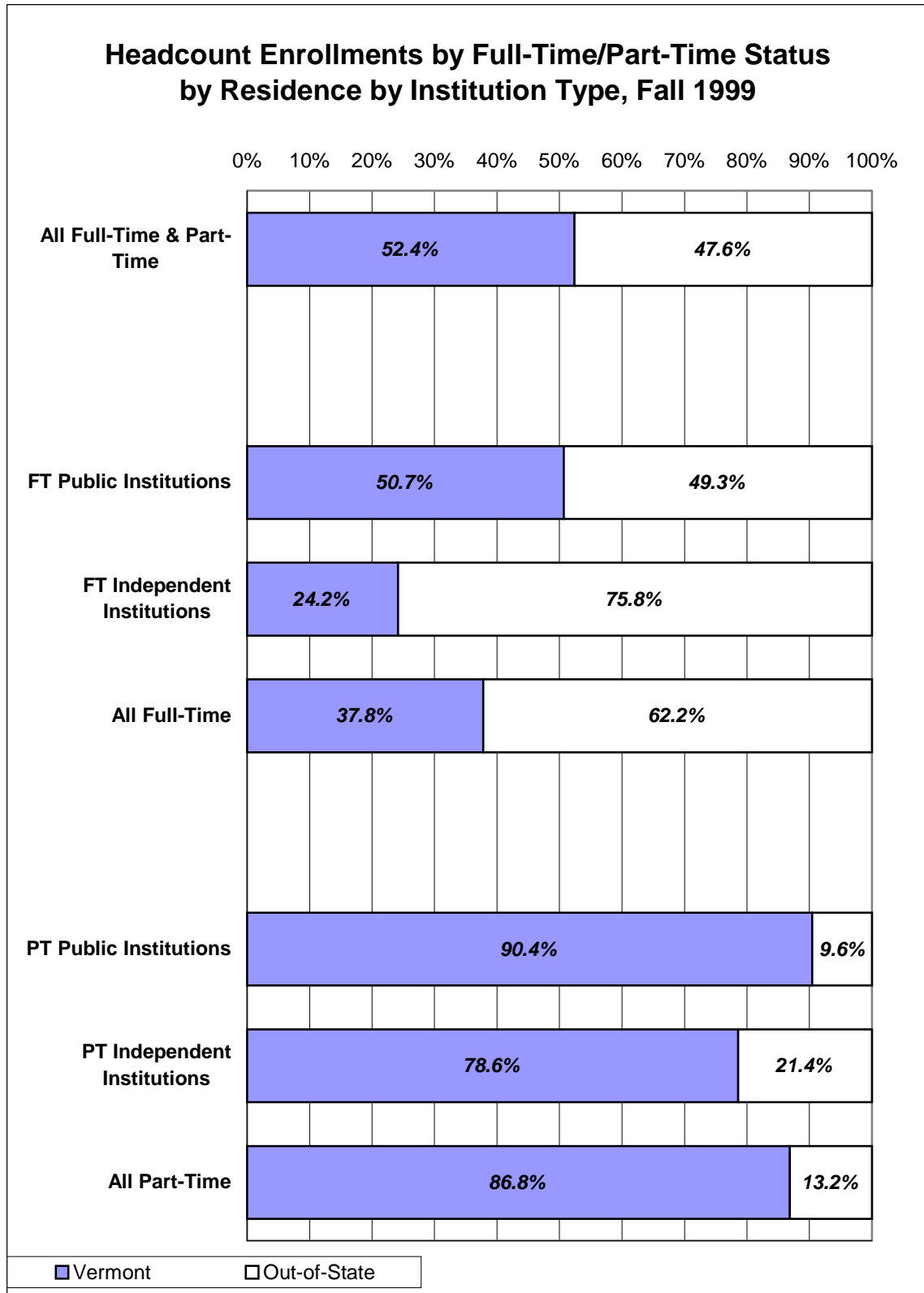

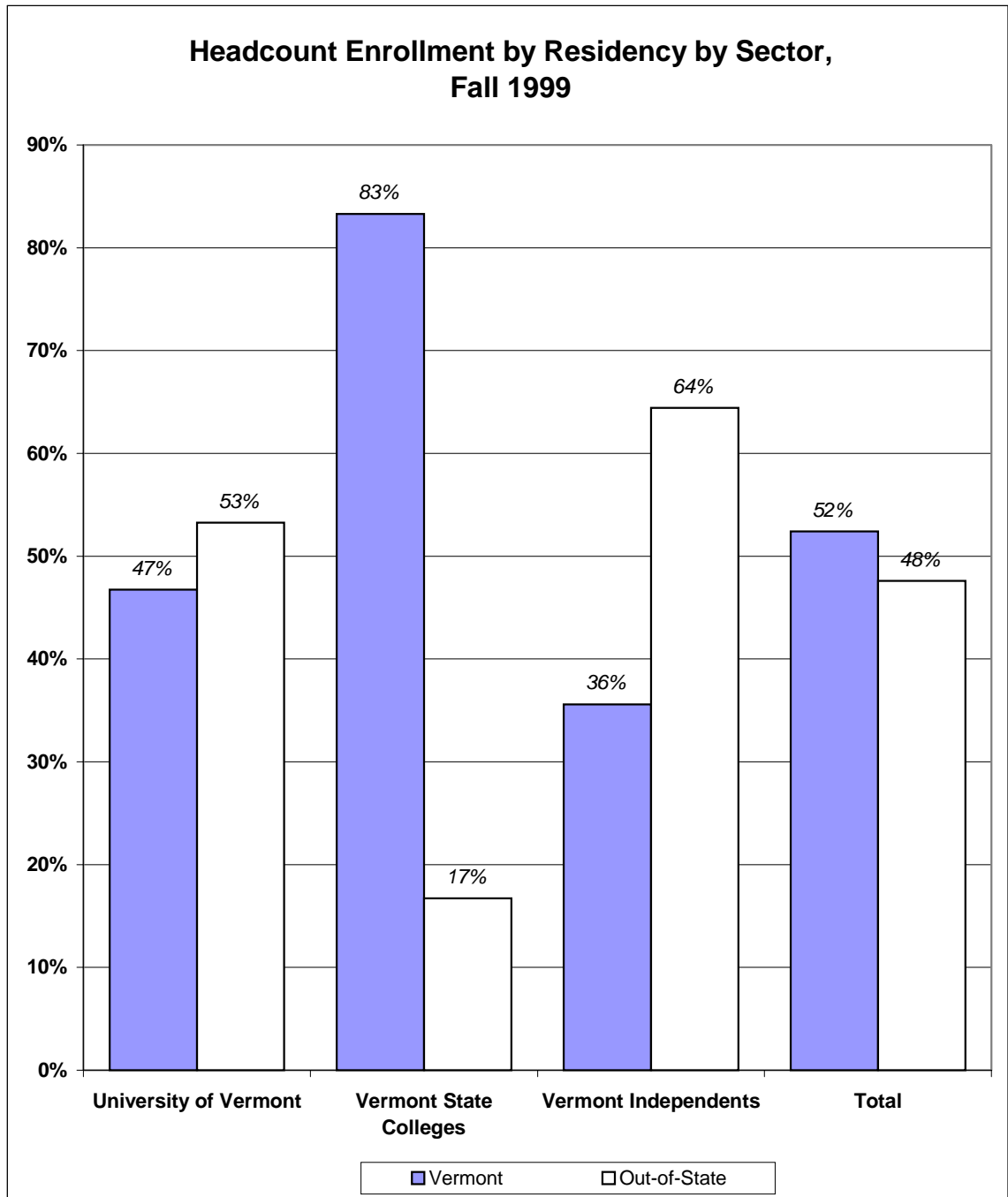

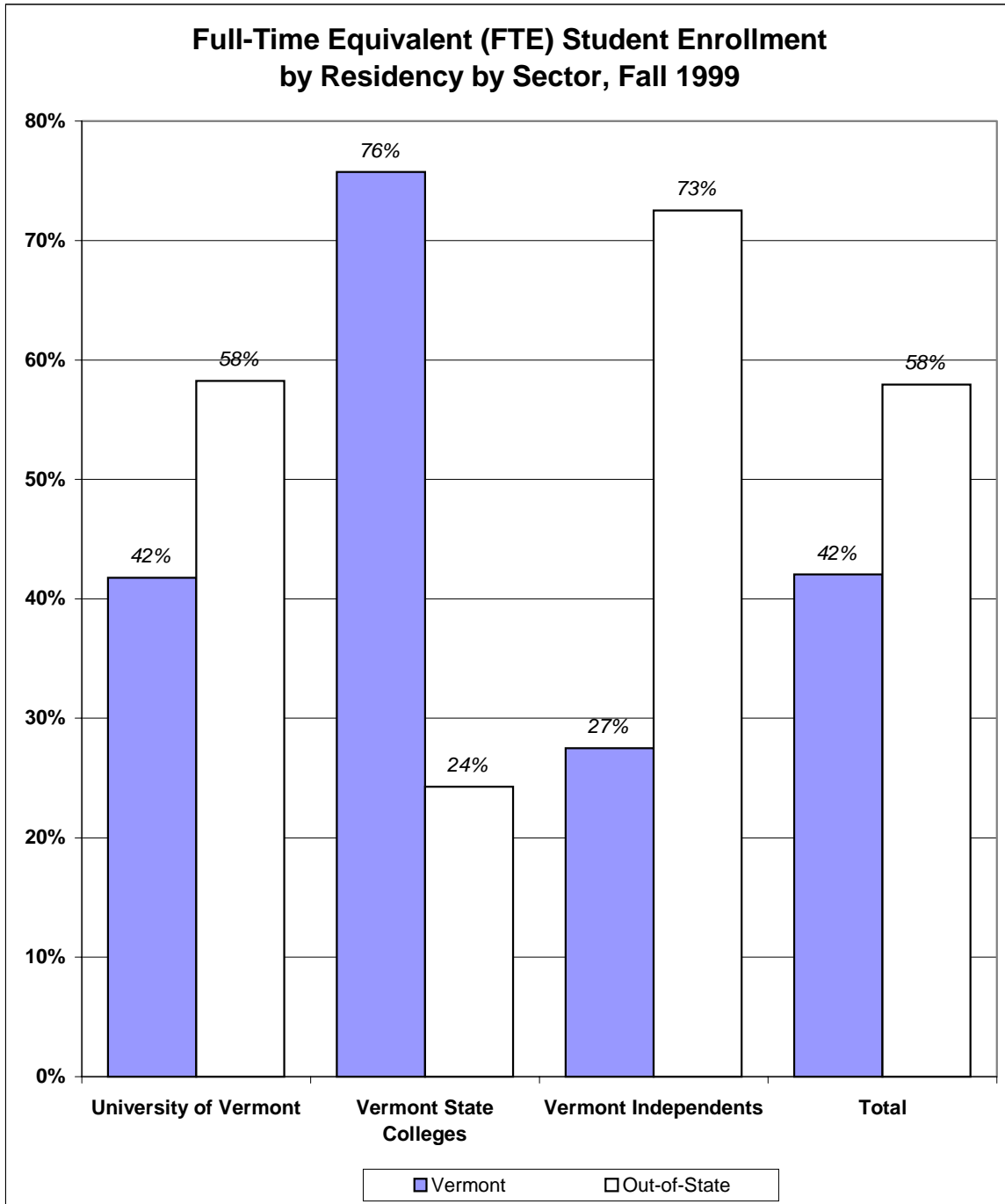

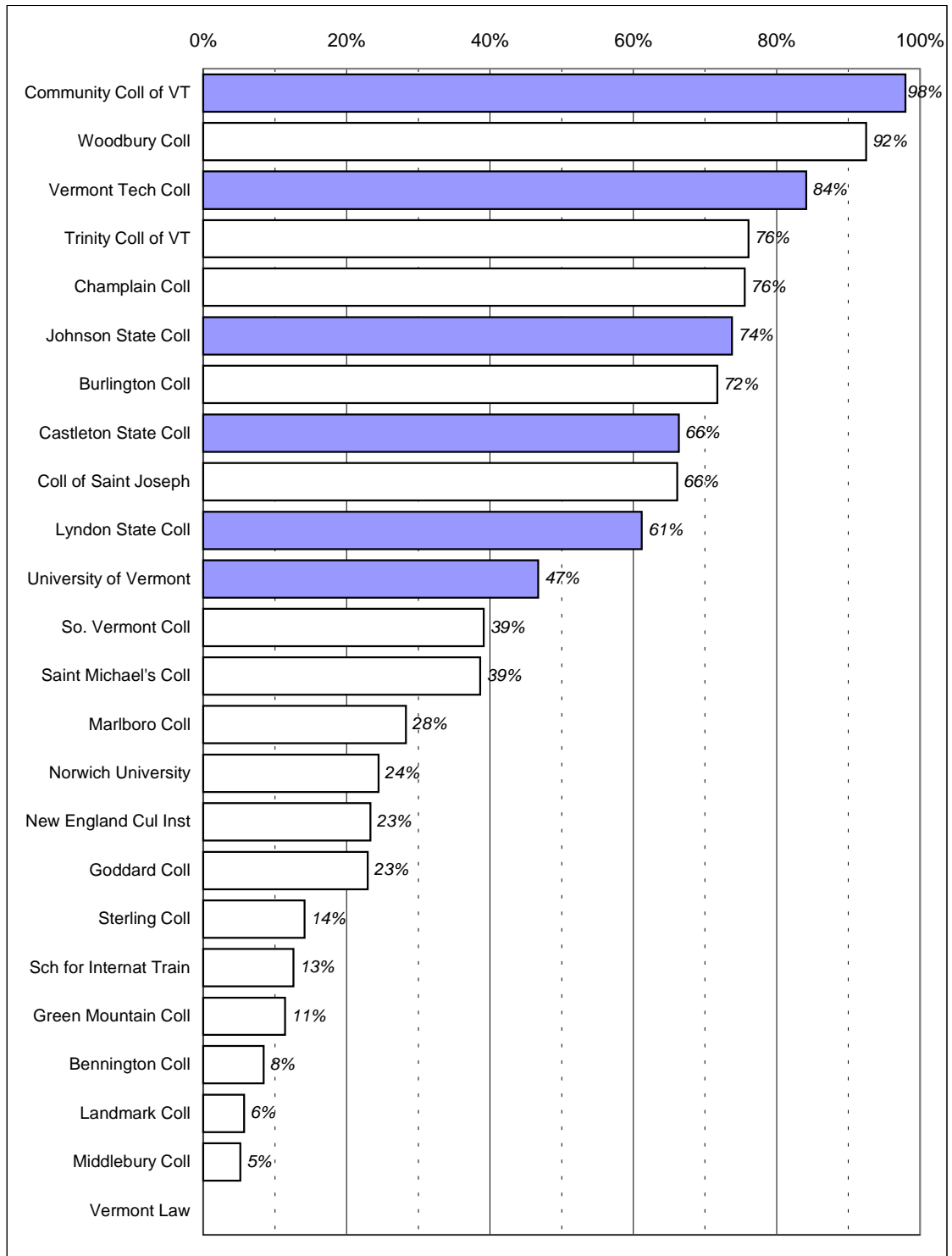

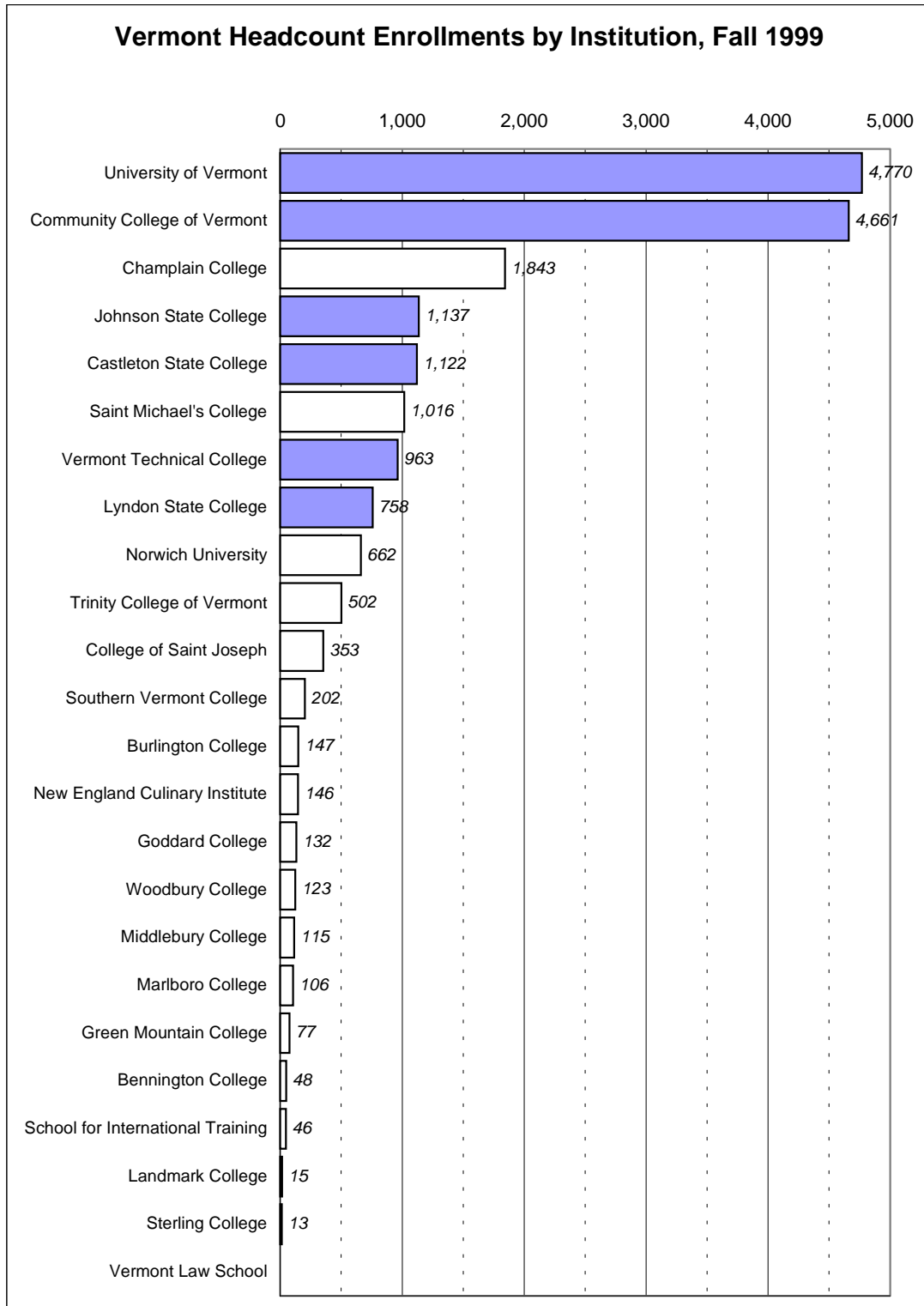

Vermonters as a Percent of Total Headcount Enrollments, Fall 1999



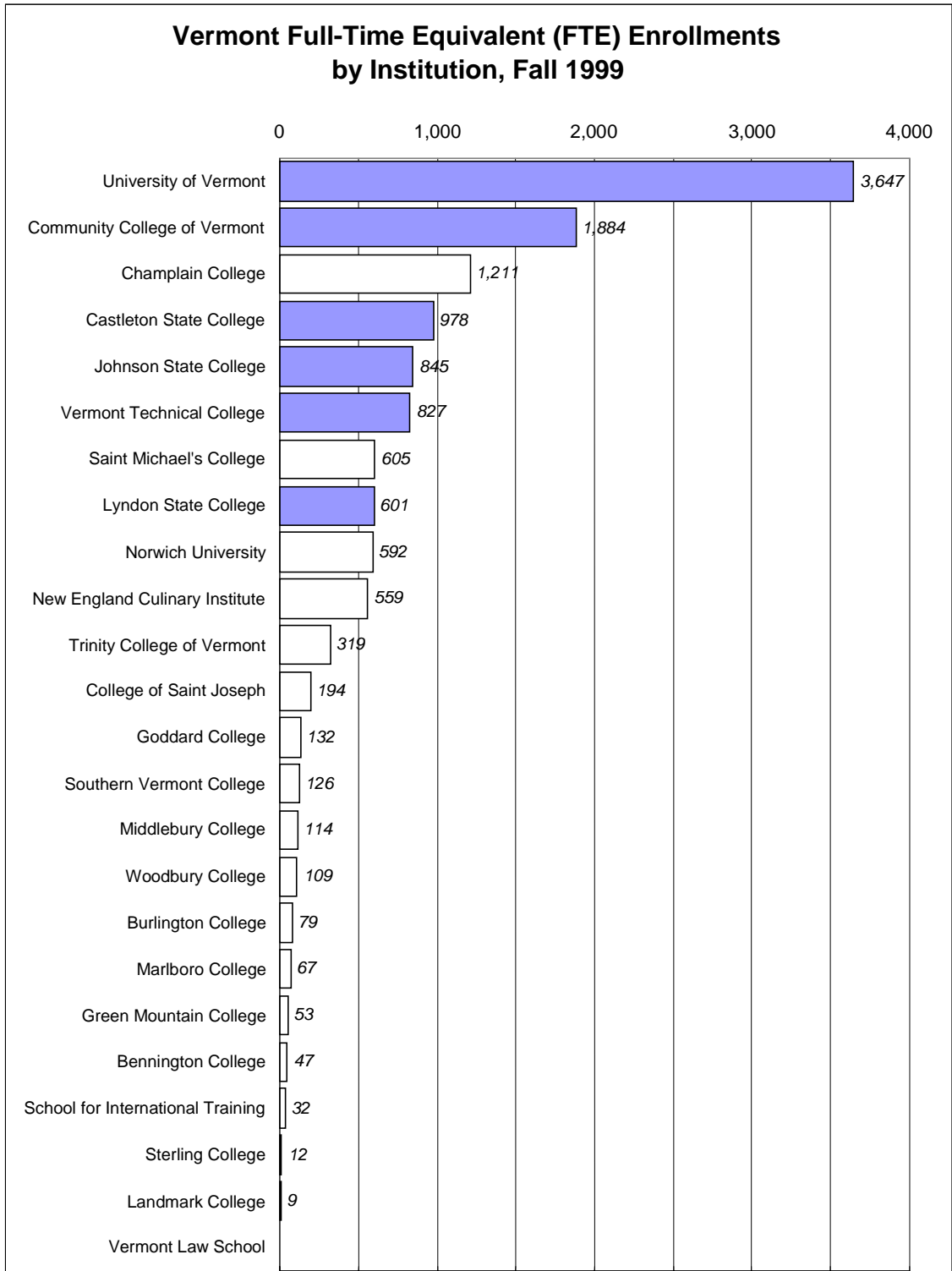

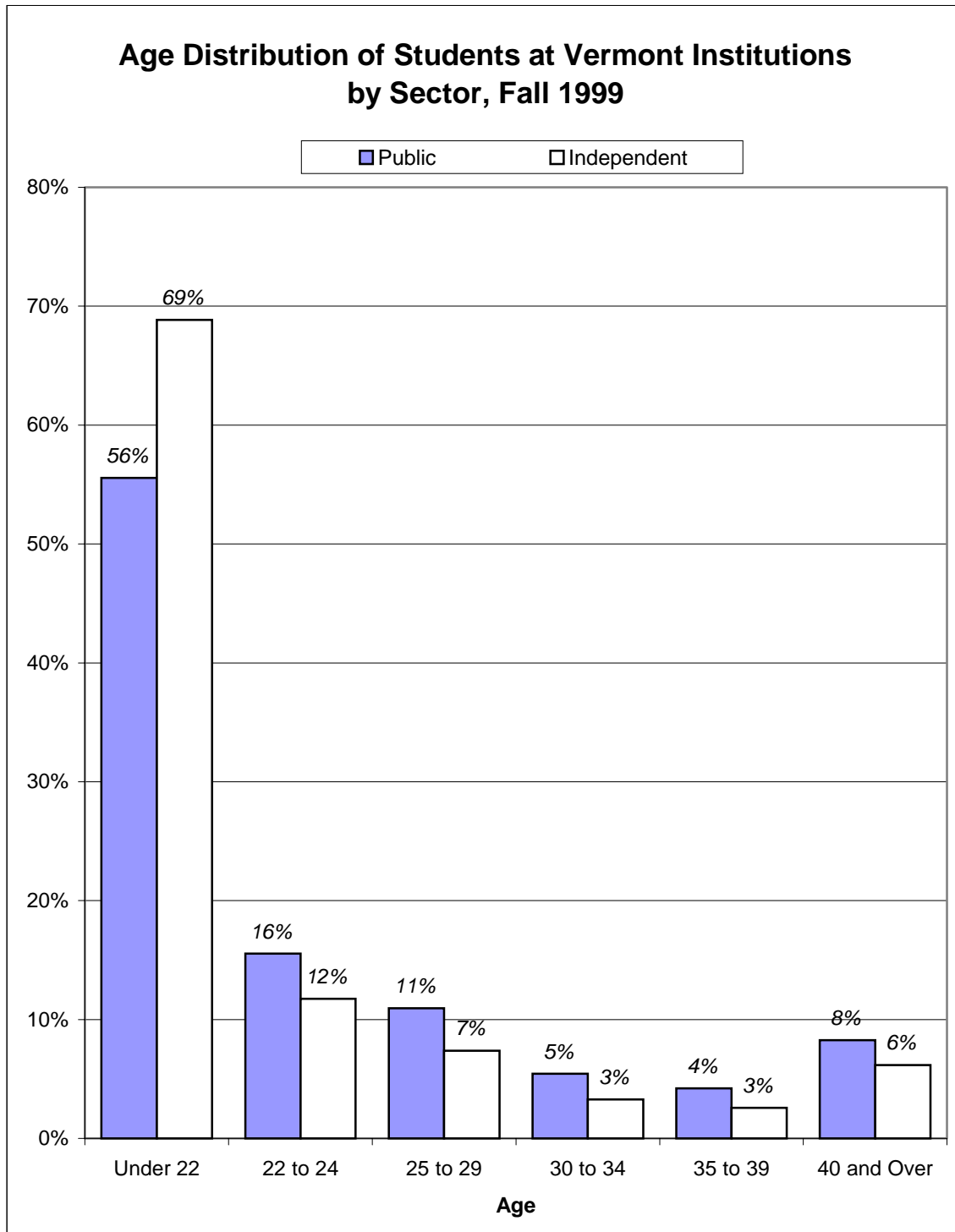

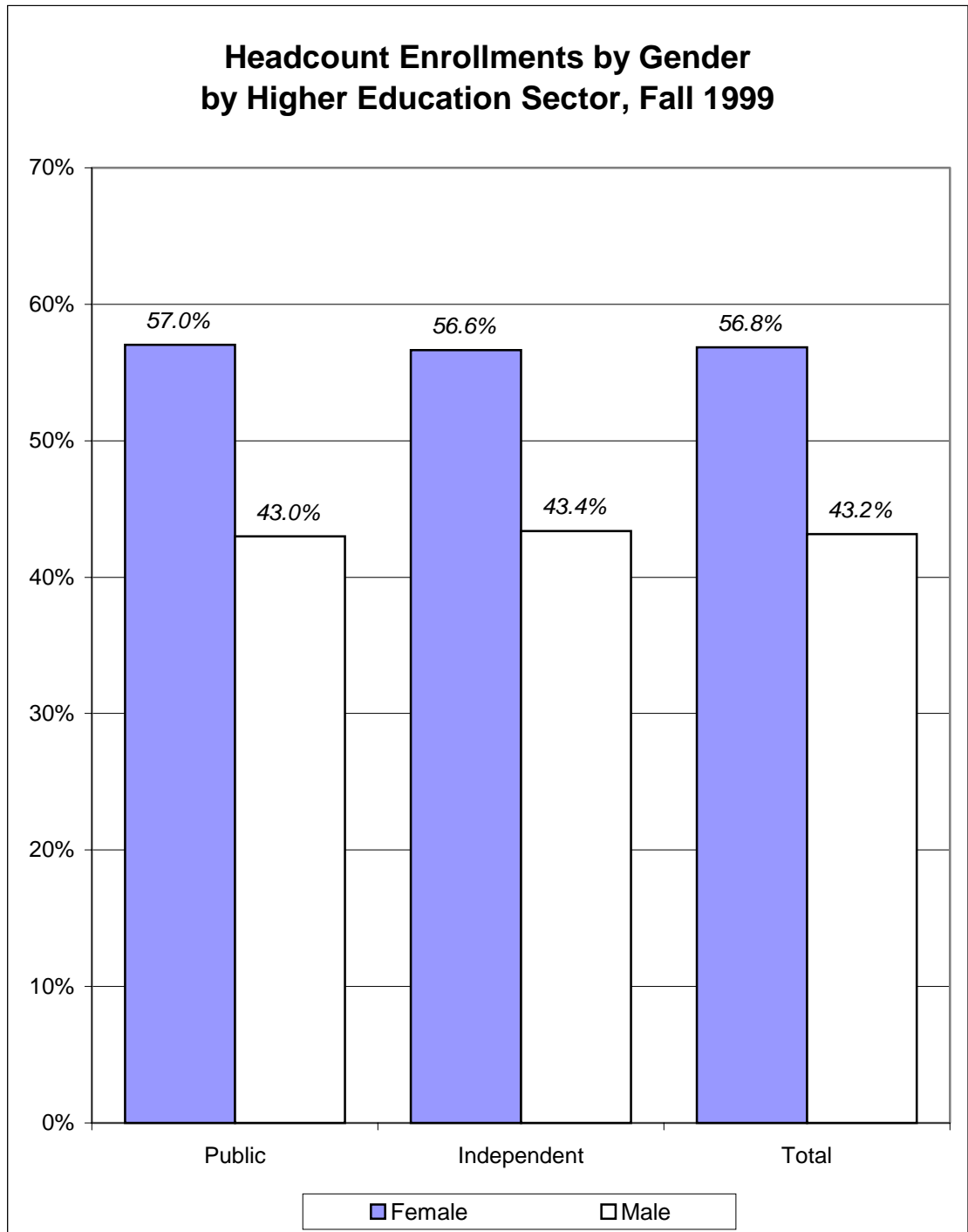

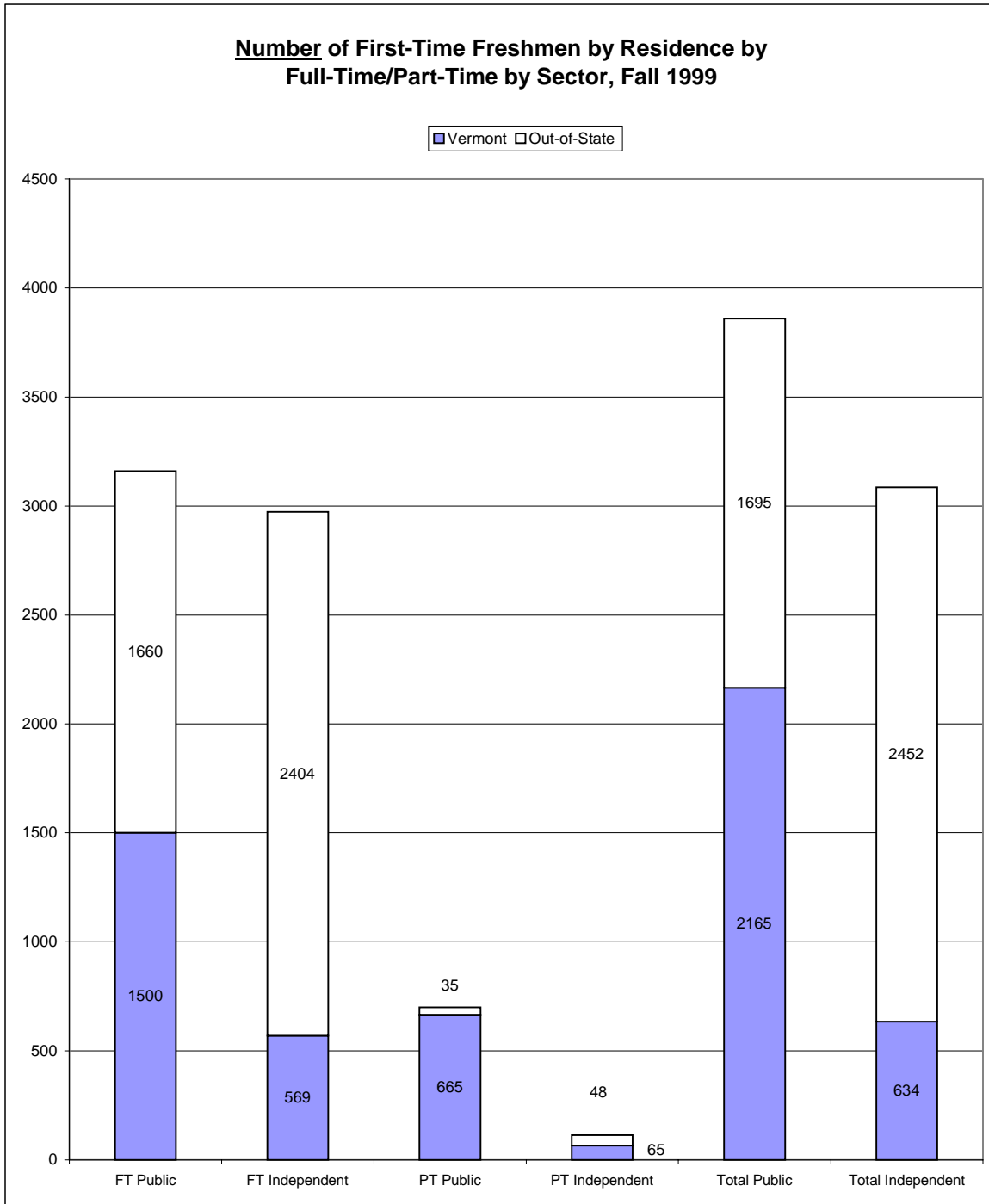

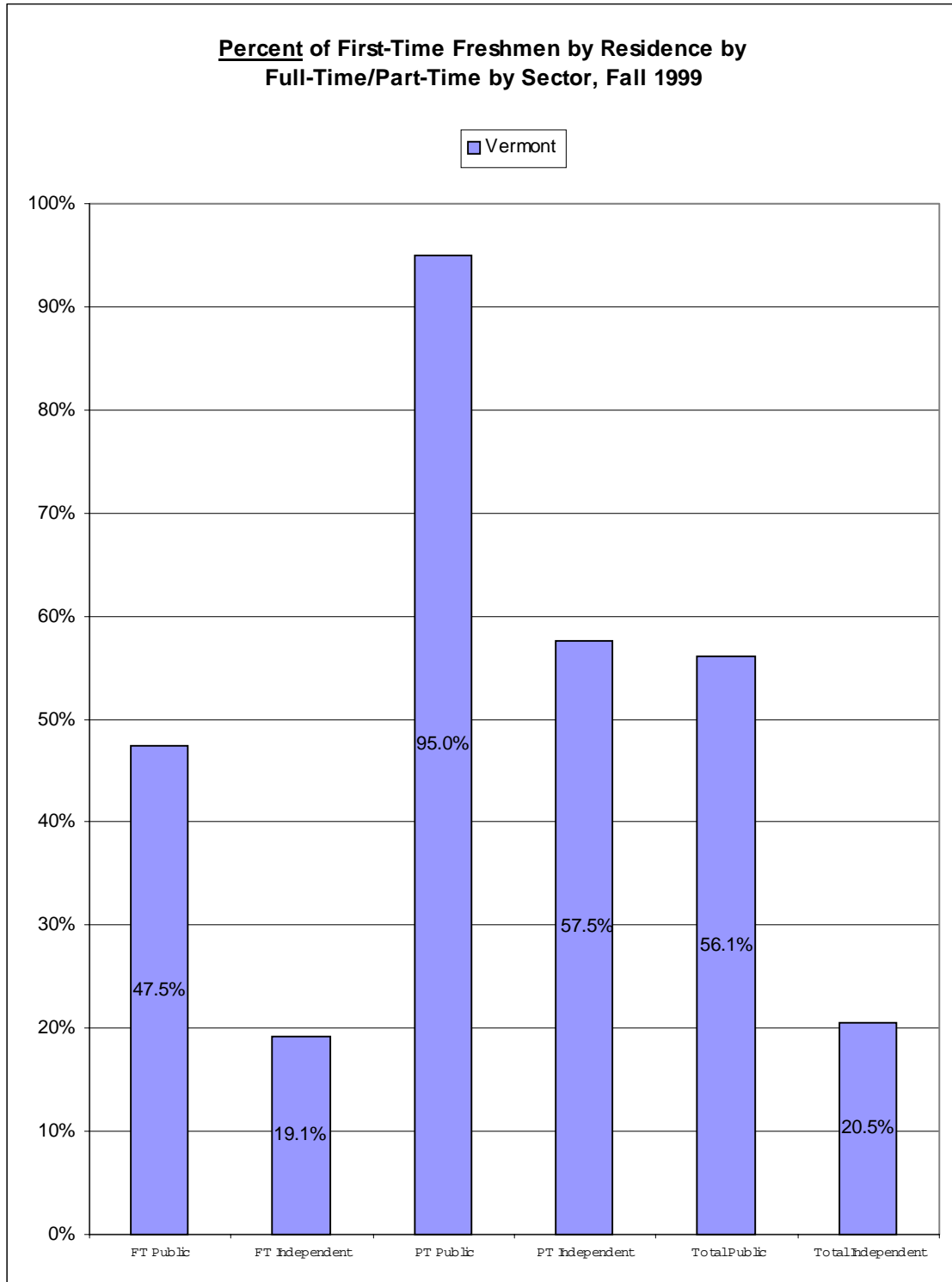

**Where First-Time, First Year Vermonters Go To College:
Vermont vs. Out-of-State***

New college students have different enrollment patterns, depending upon their age. In fall 1996, recent high school graduates left the state at a higher rate (52%) than did older first-time students. Of those who graduated from high school before 1995, almost 80% were attending college in Vermont in 1996.

- **Recent high school graduates** primarily attend traditional, four-year institutions that are in surrounding states (Massachusetts, Maine, New Hampshire, and New York.)

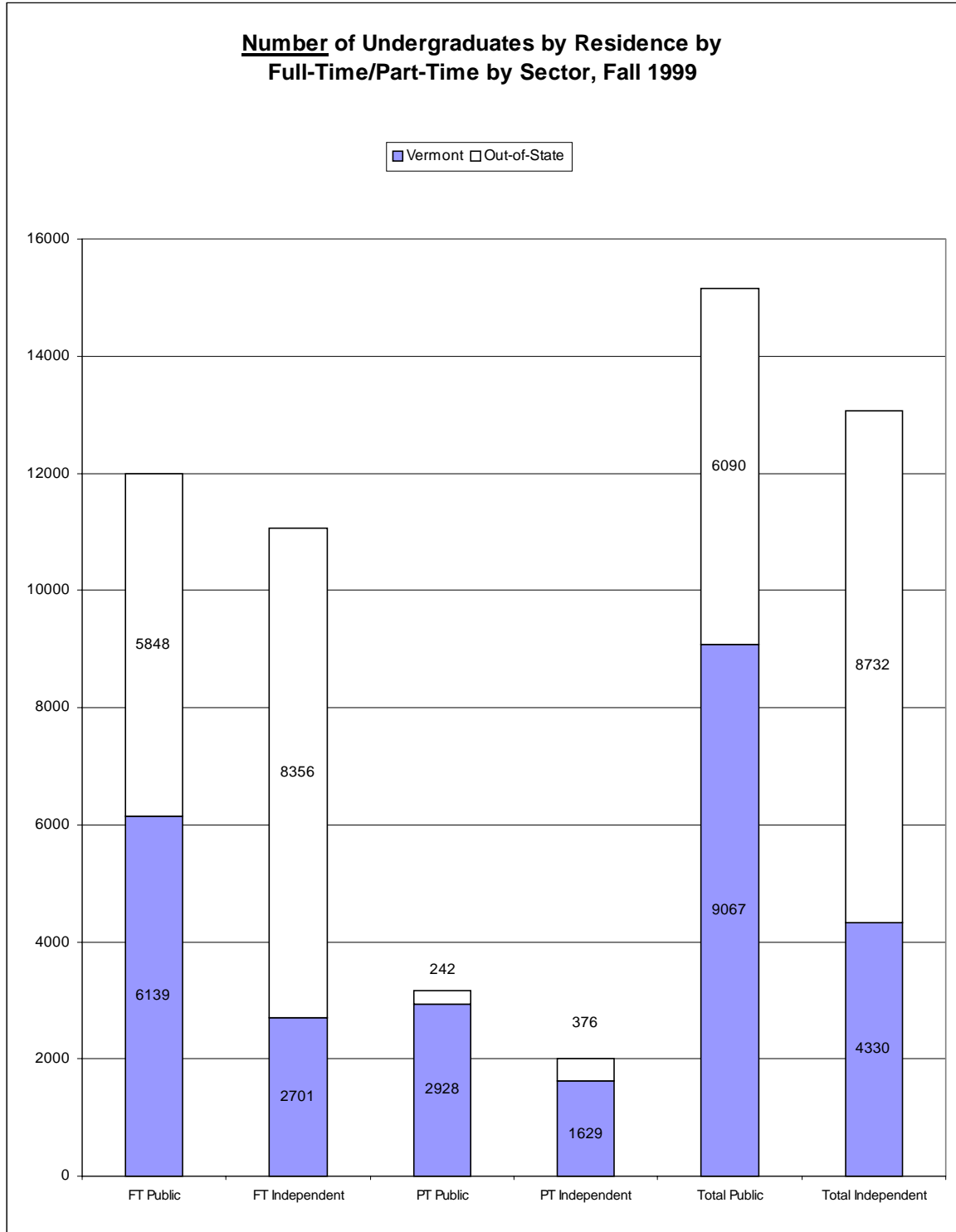

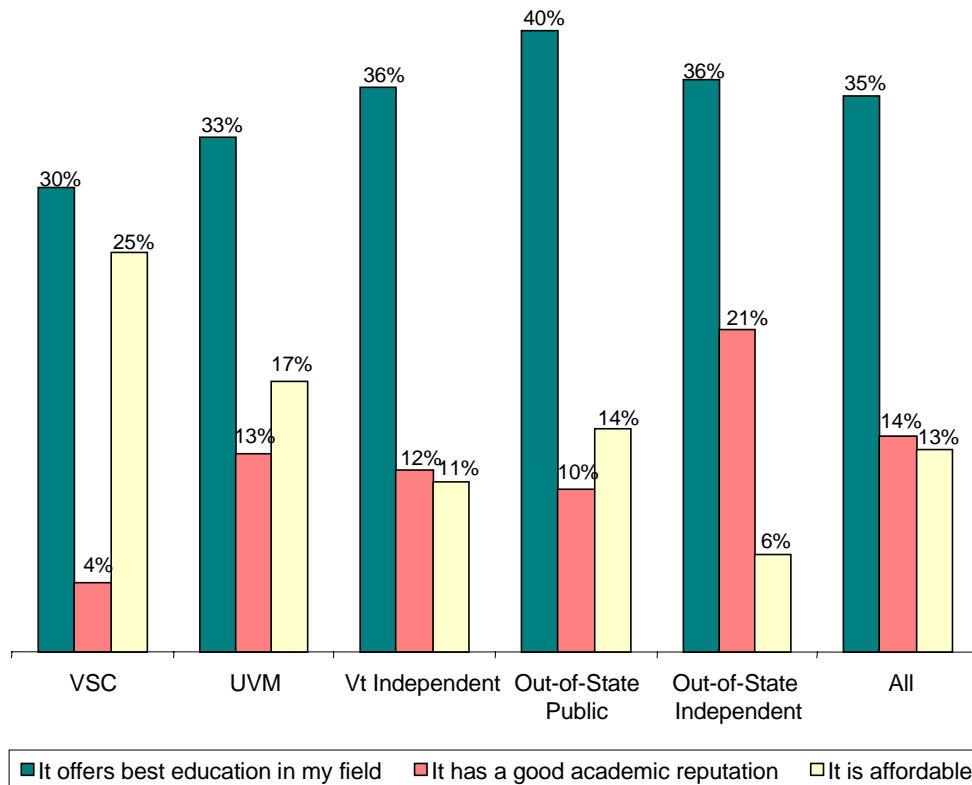

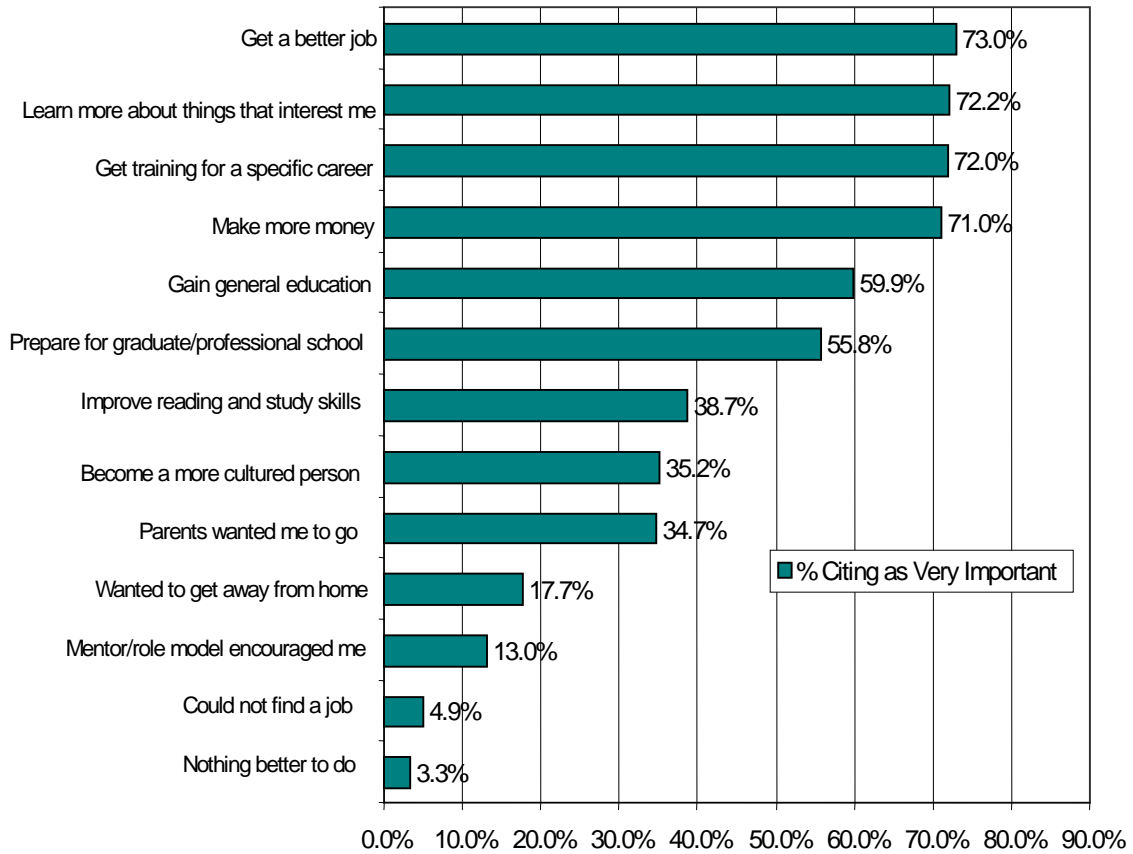

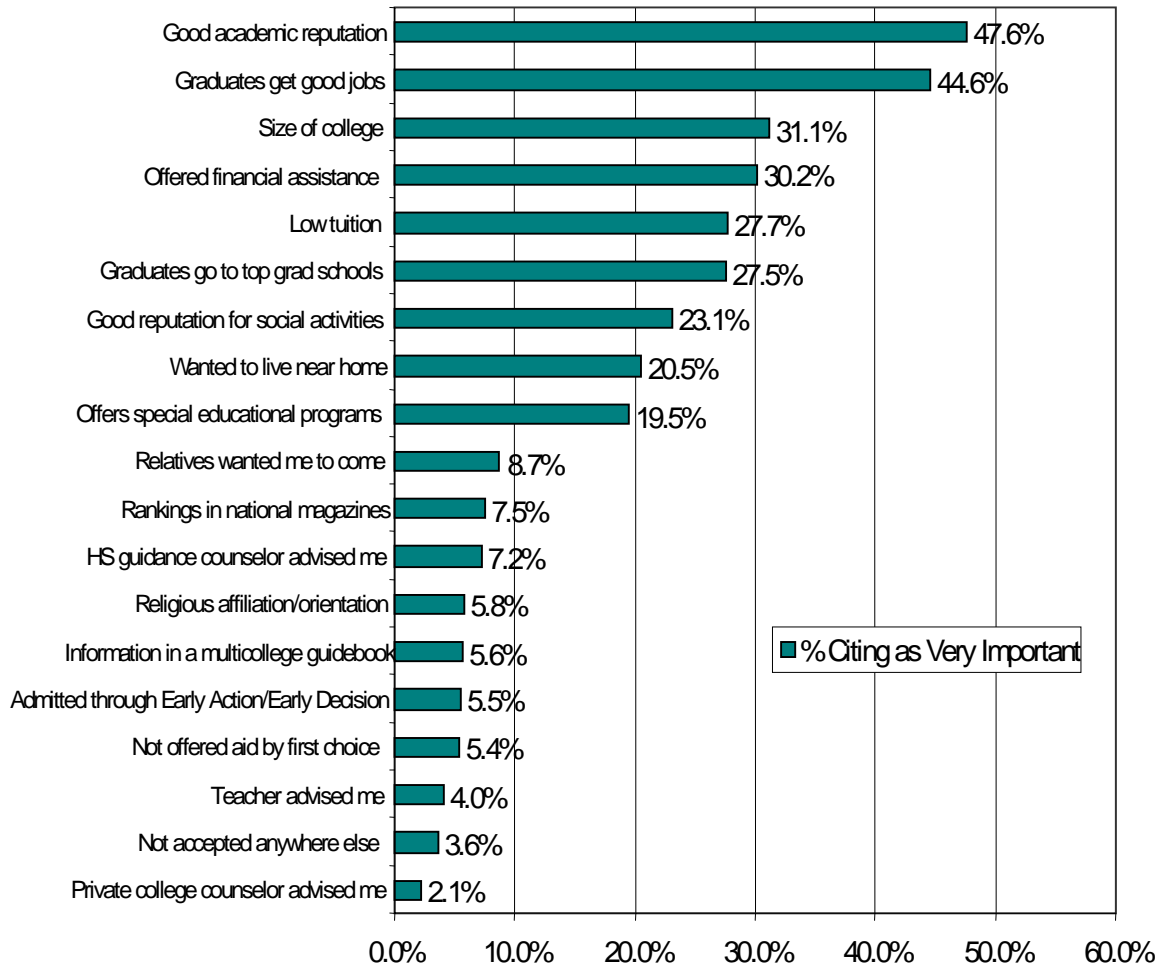

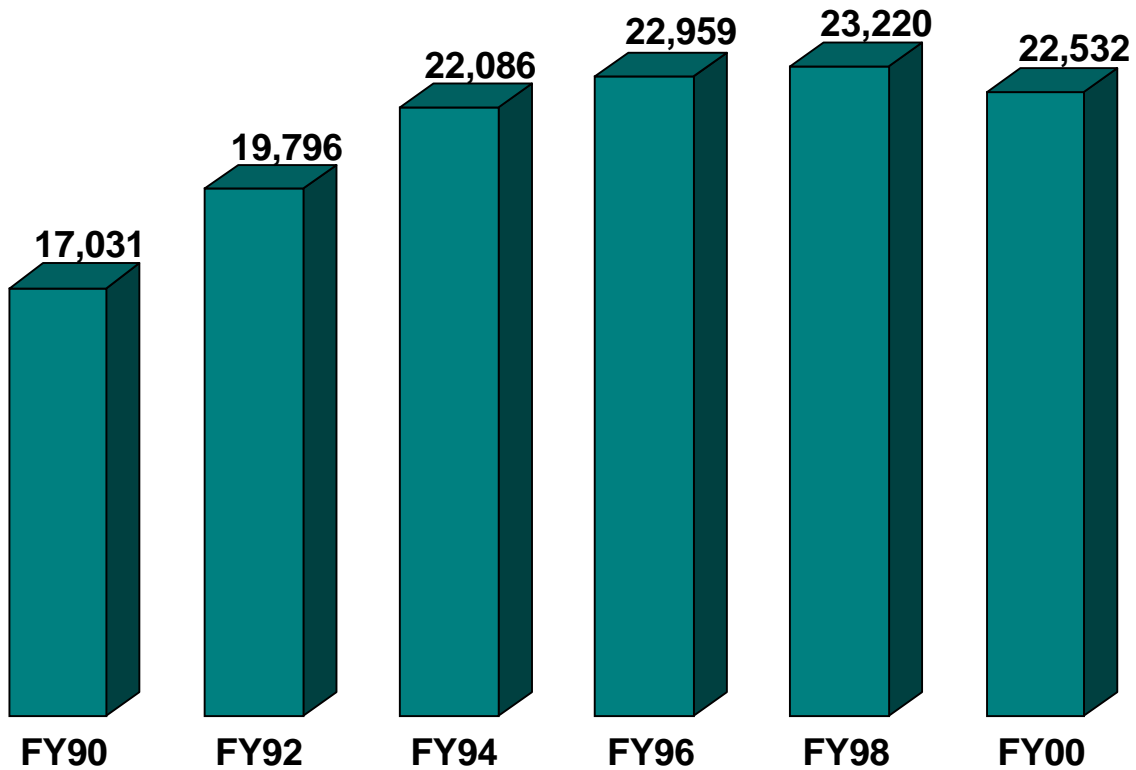
VSAC Incentive Grant Funding Model

VSAC Grant Applicants (Full-Time, Part-Time, Non-Degree)

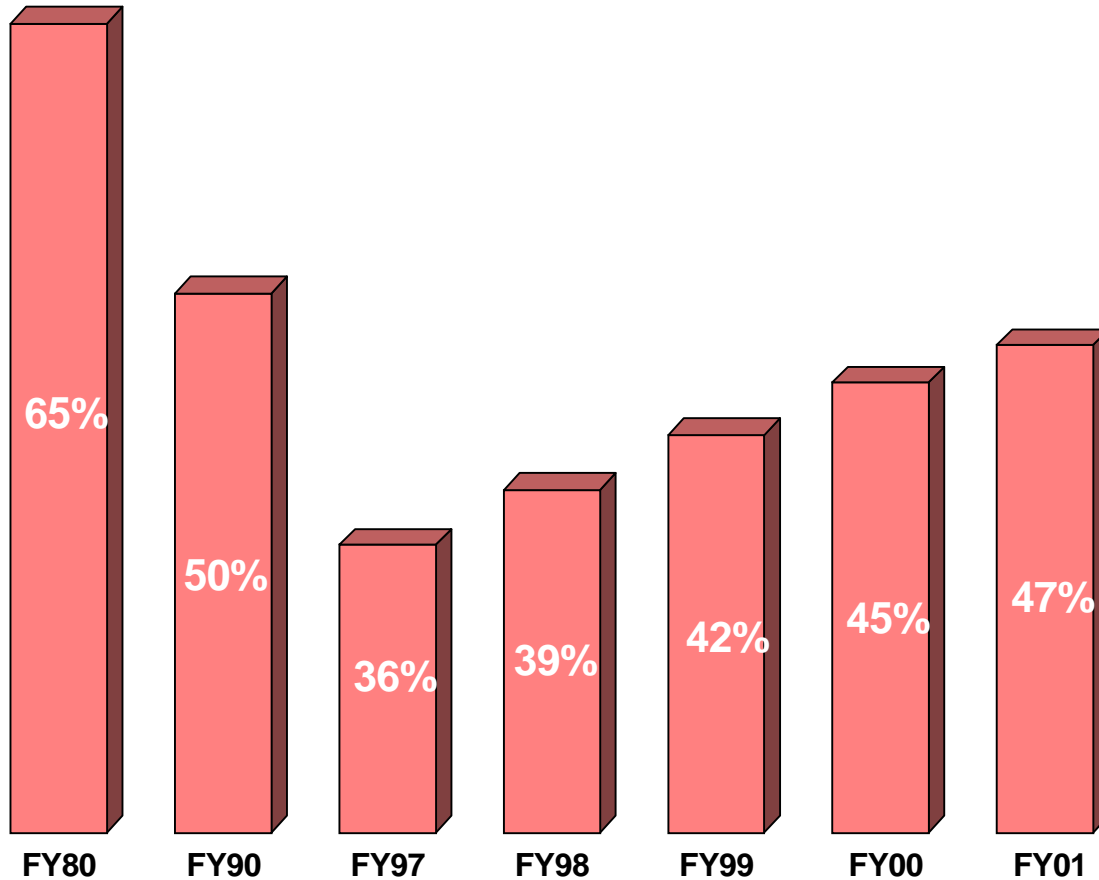

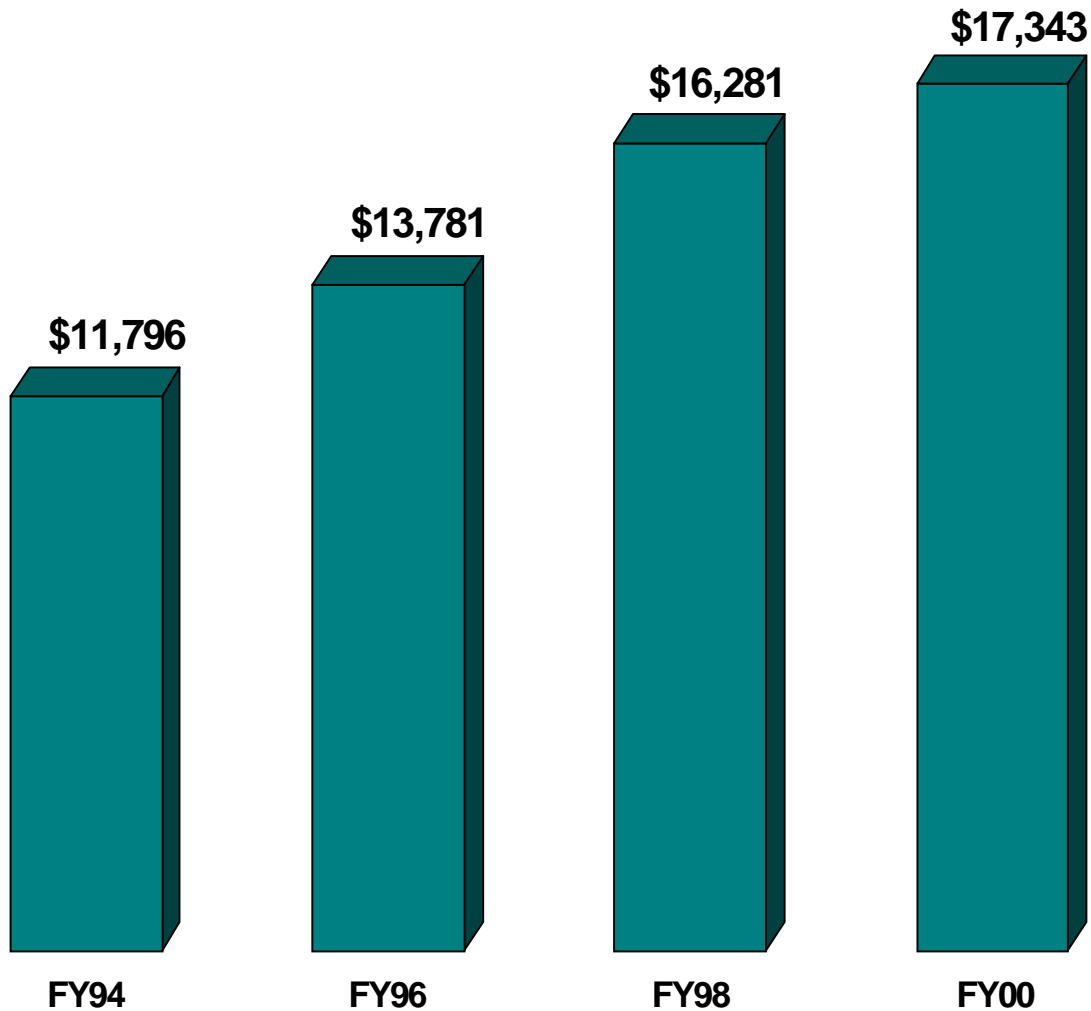

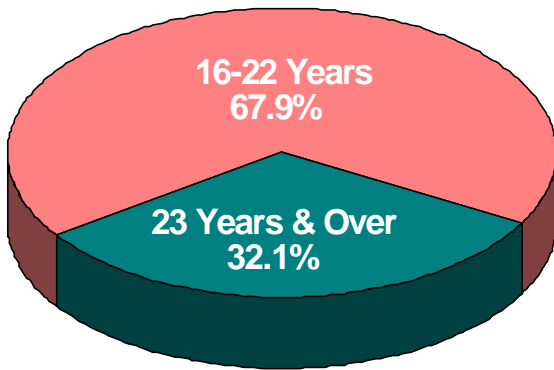

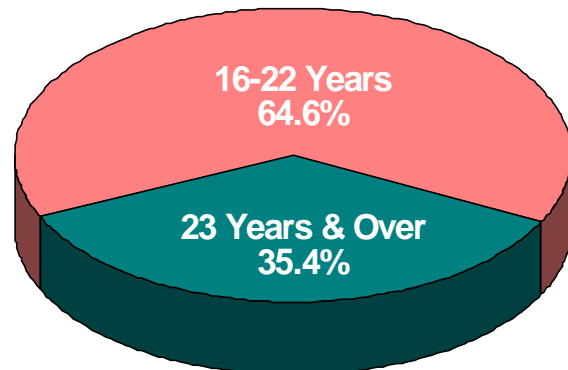

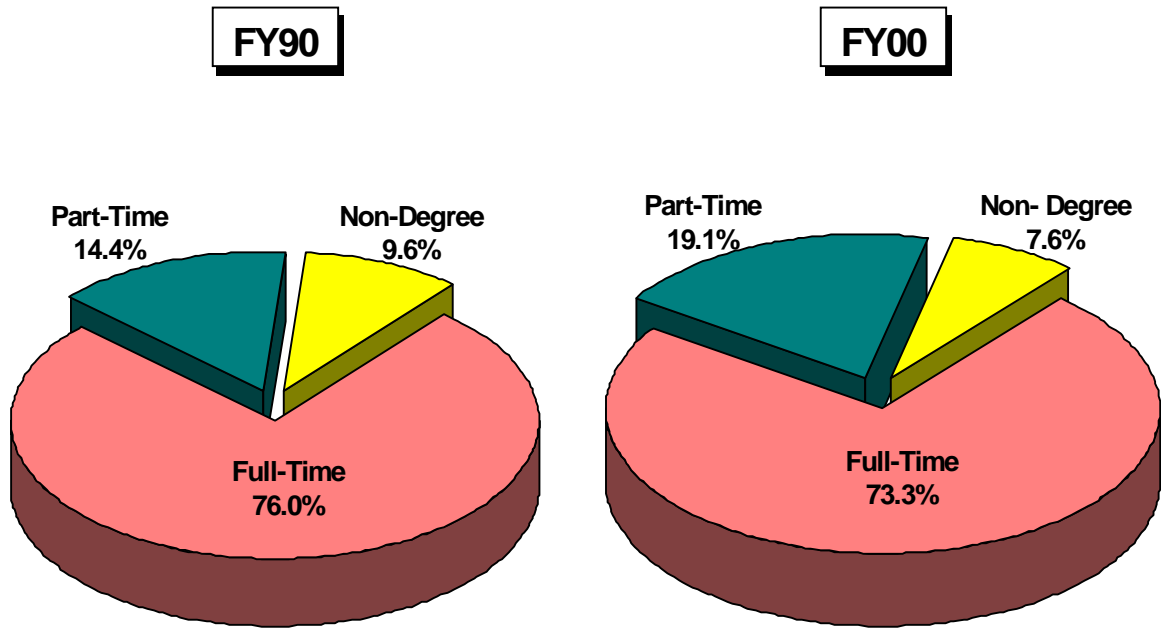

Distribution of VSAC Grant Recipients by Program

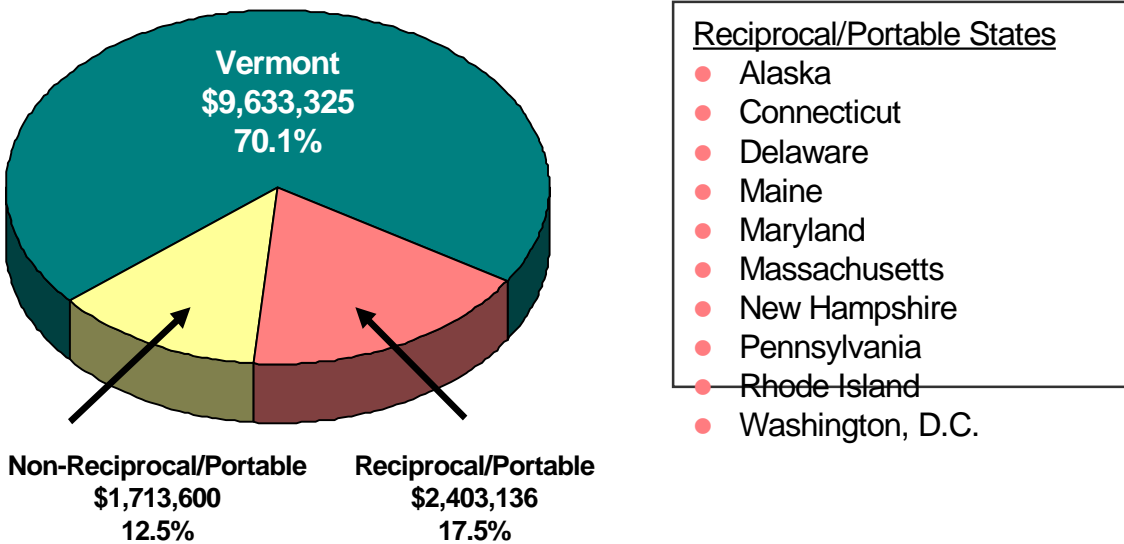

Distribution of VSAC Grants by Reciprocity

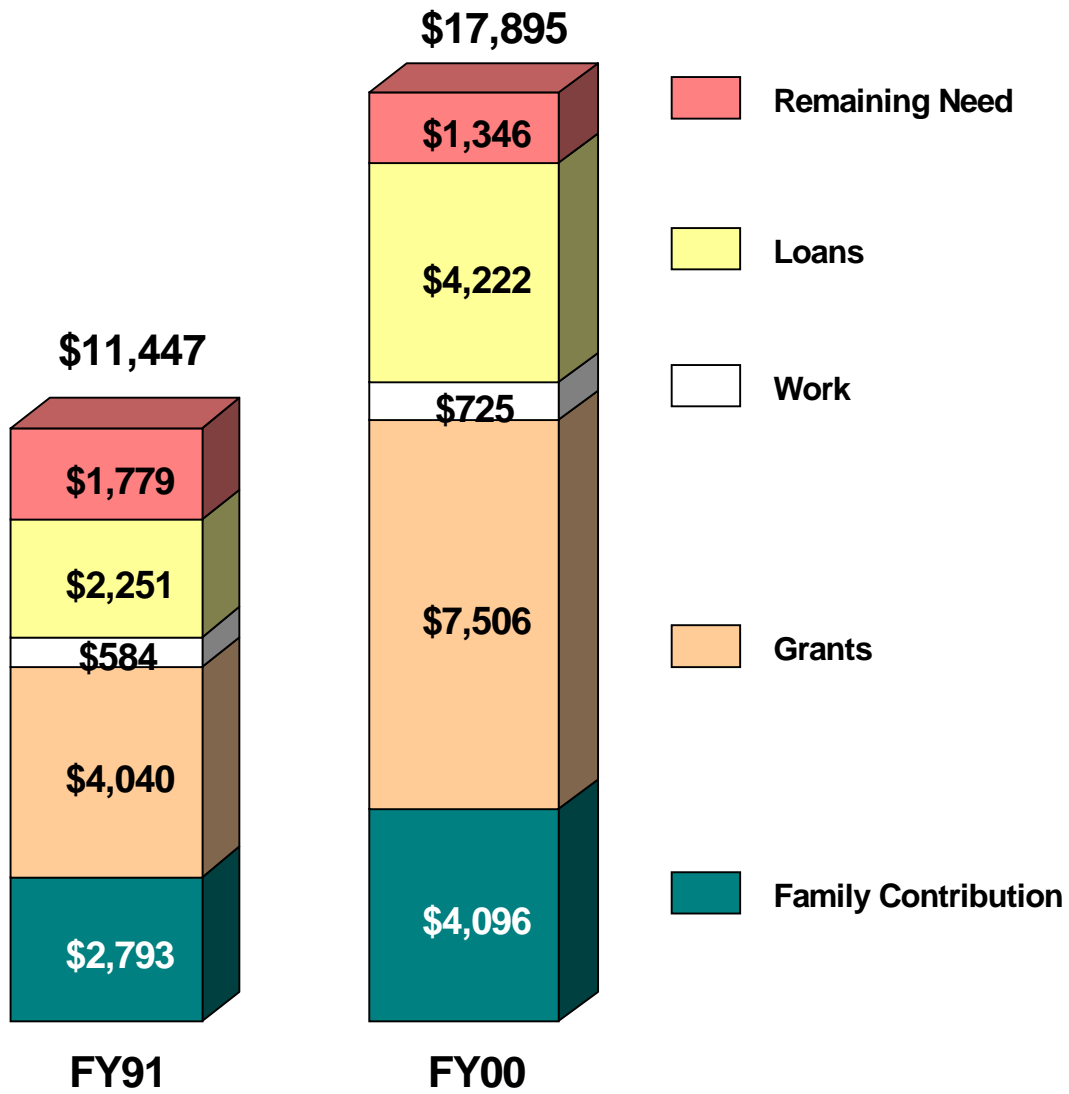

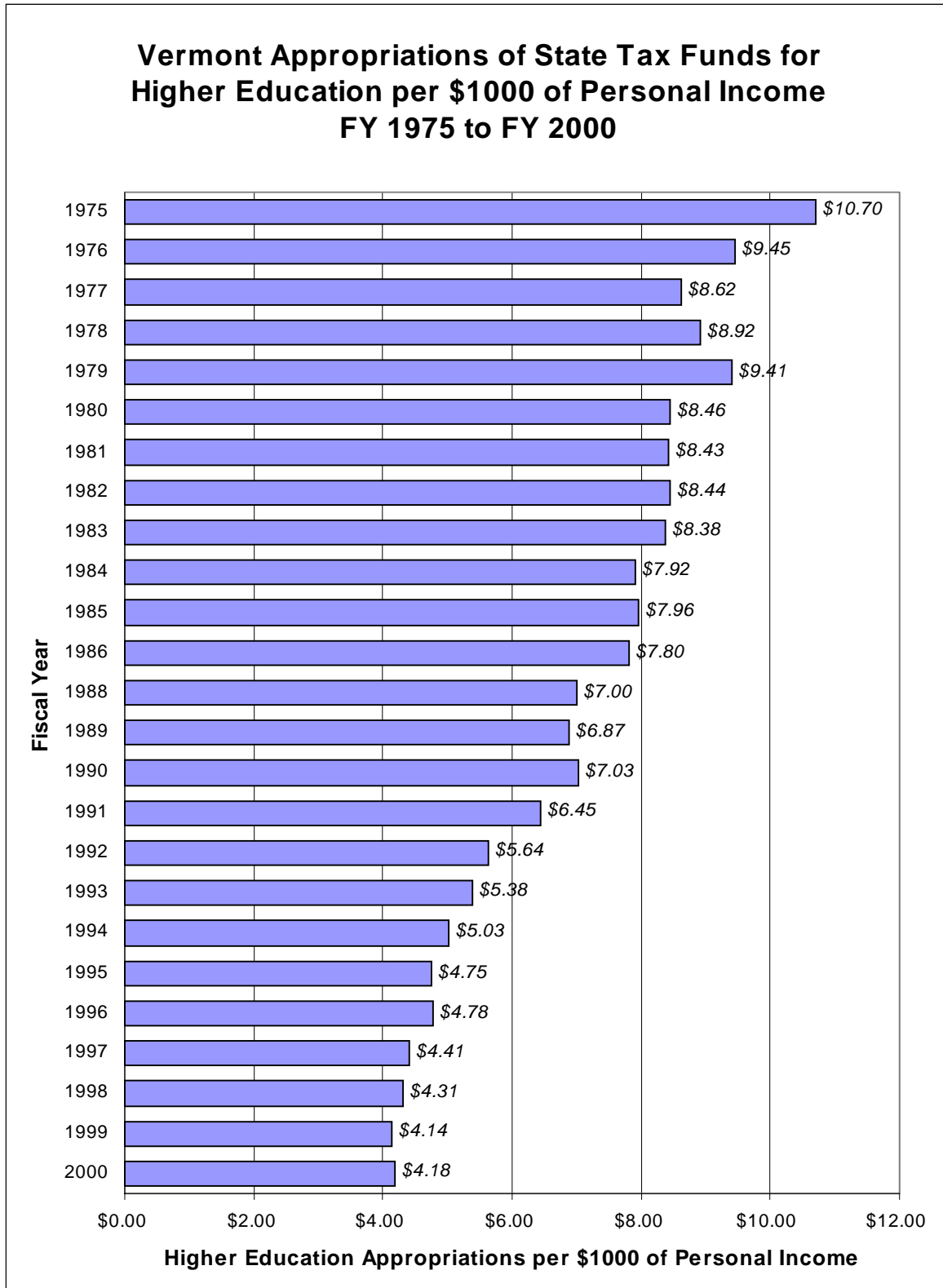

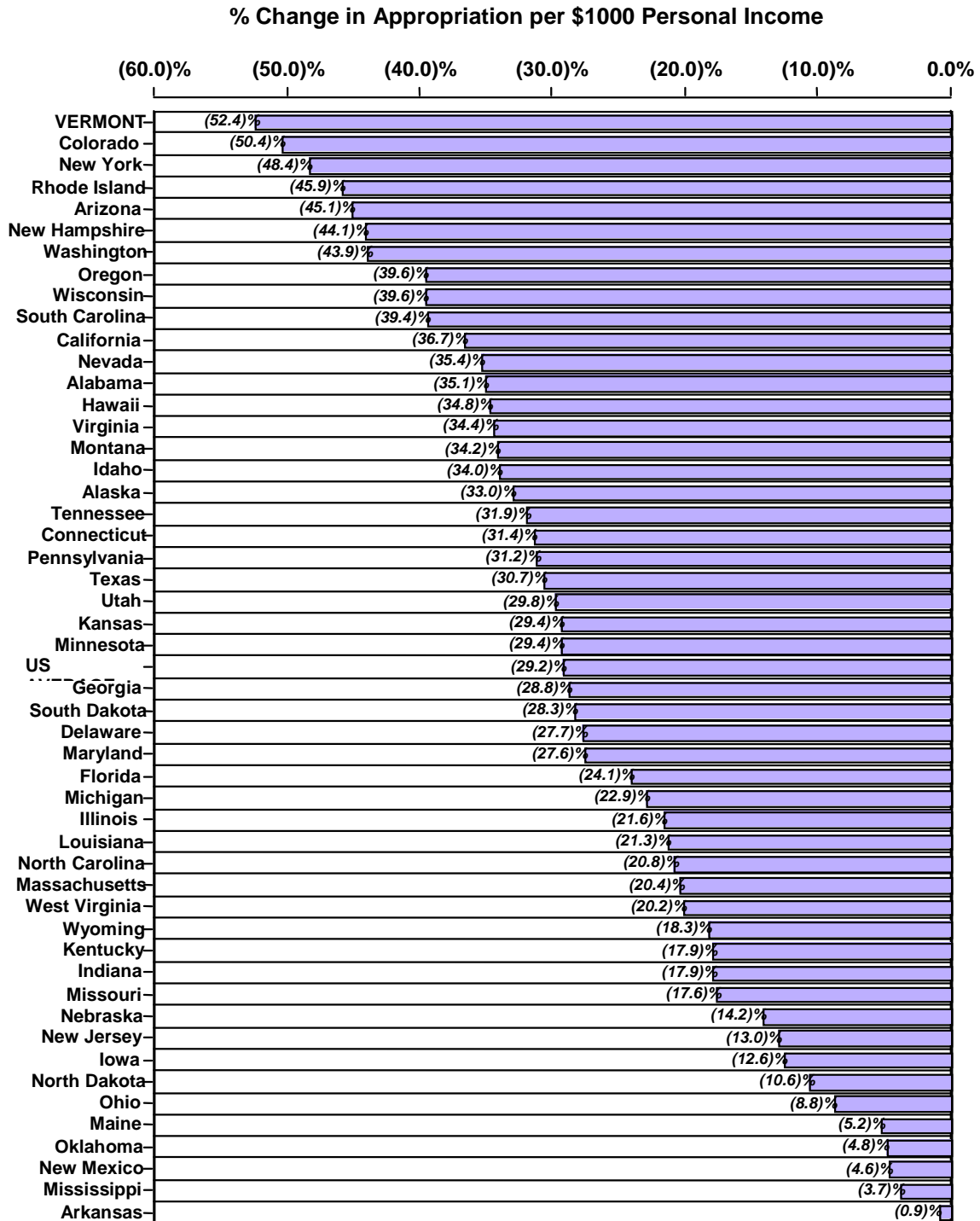

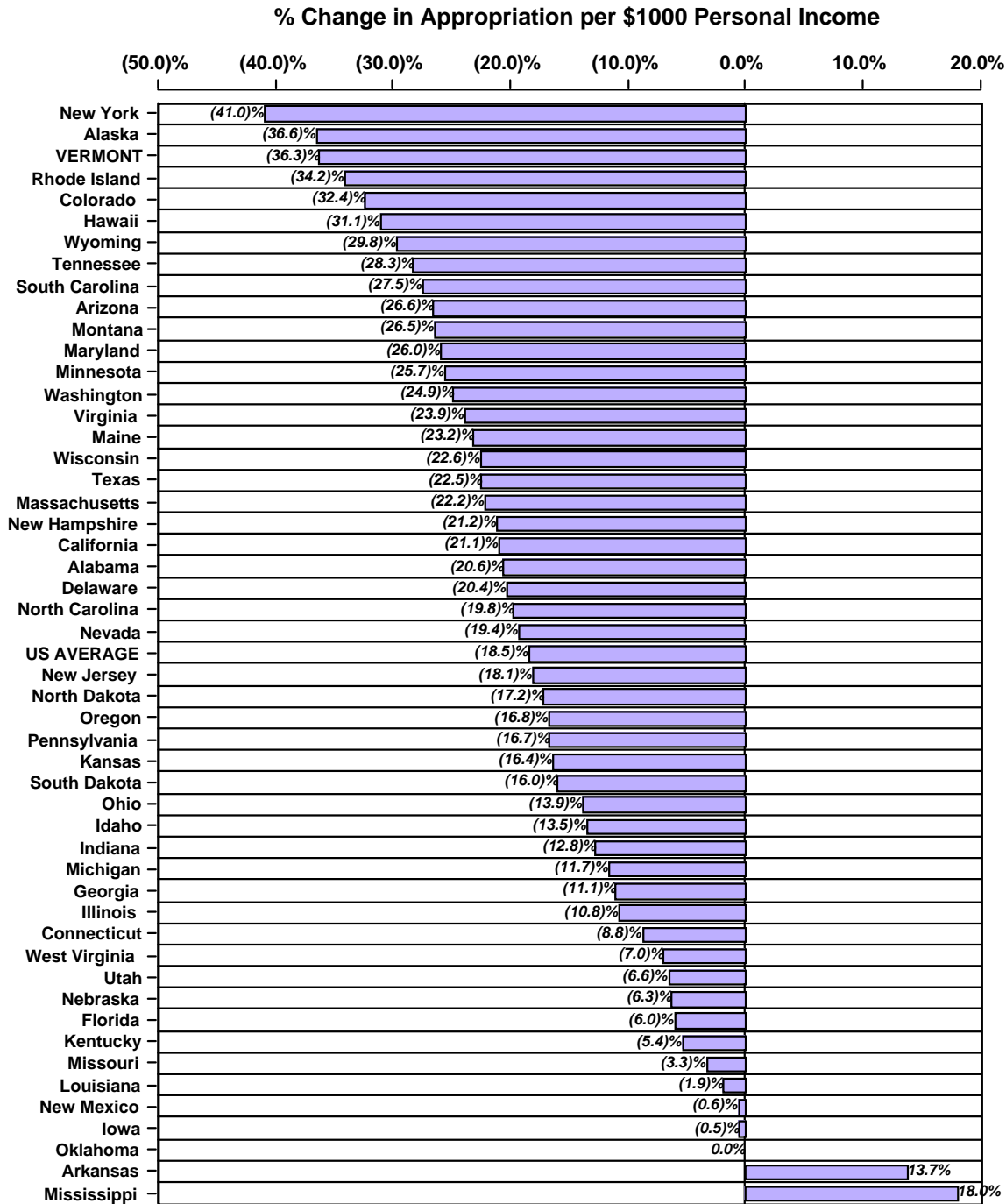
Change in State Appropriation Tax Funds for Higher Education per \$1000 Personal Income Between FY 1979 to FY 2000



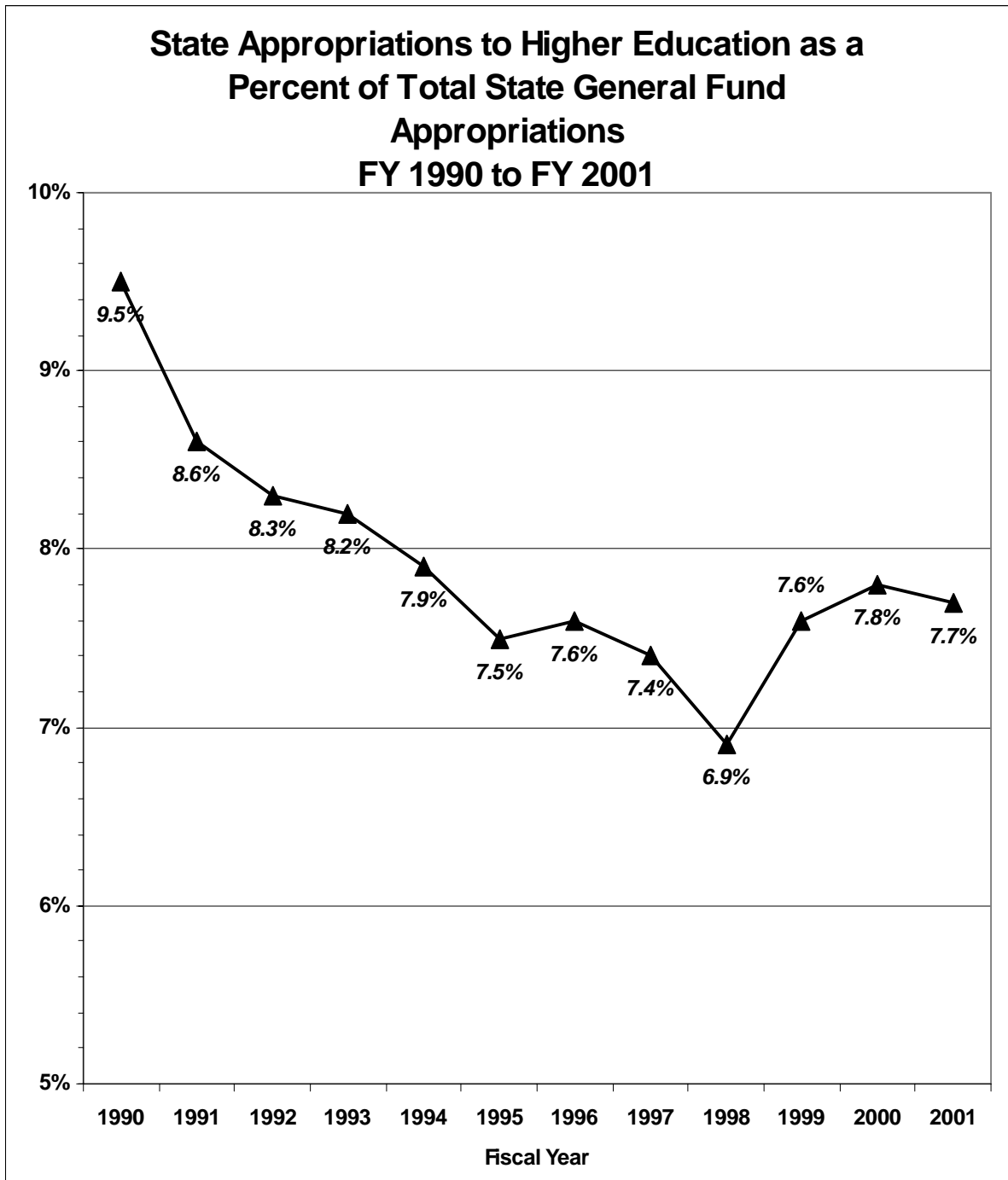

Change in State Appropriation Tax Funds for Higher Education per \$1000 Personal Income Between FY 1990 to FY 2000



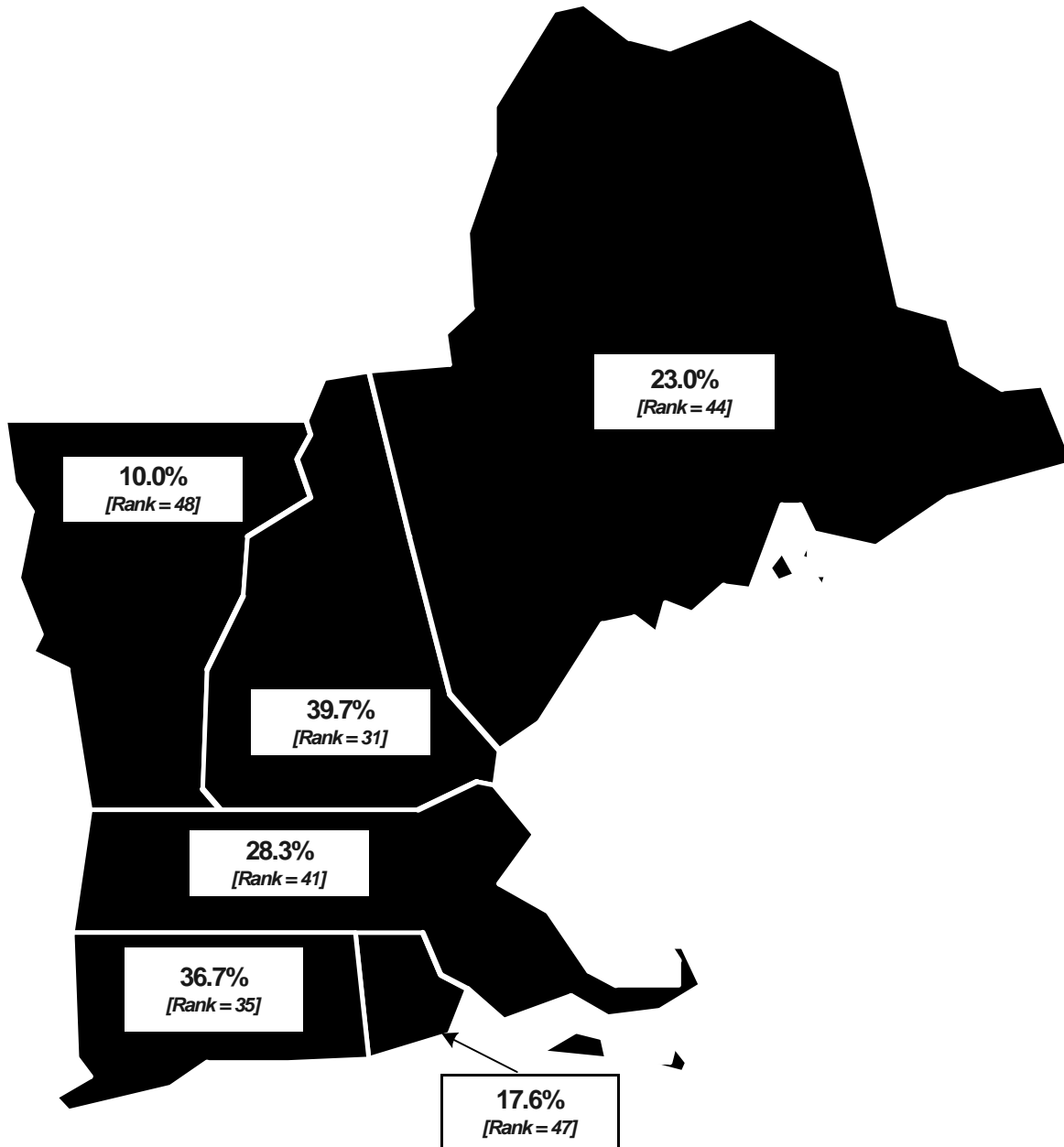

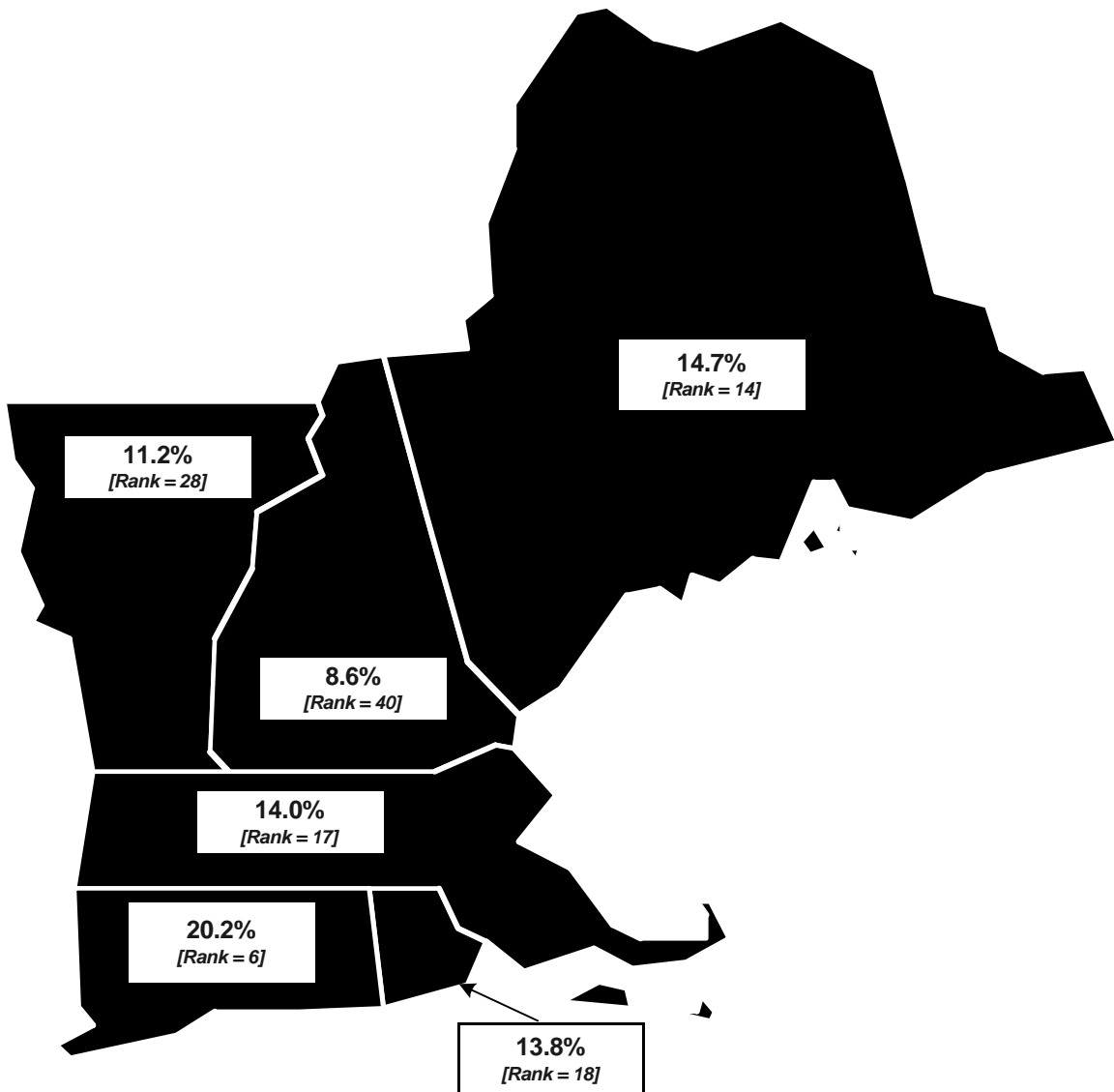

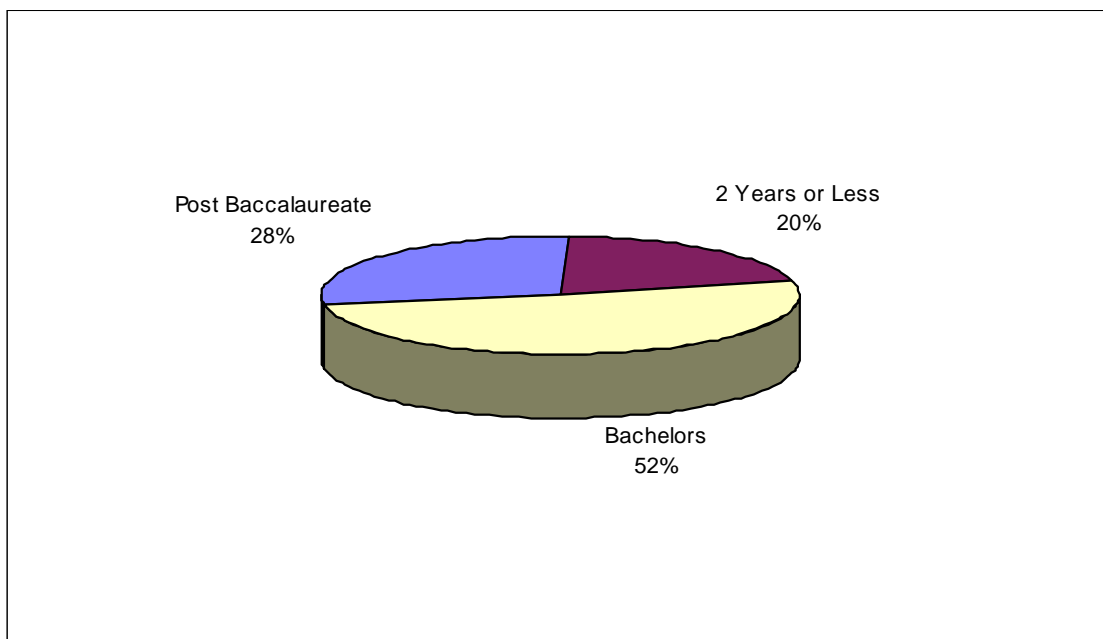
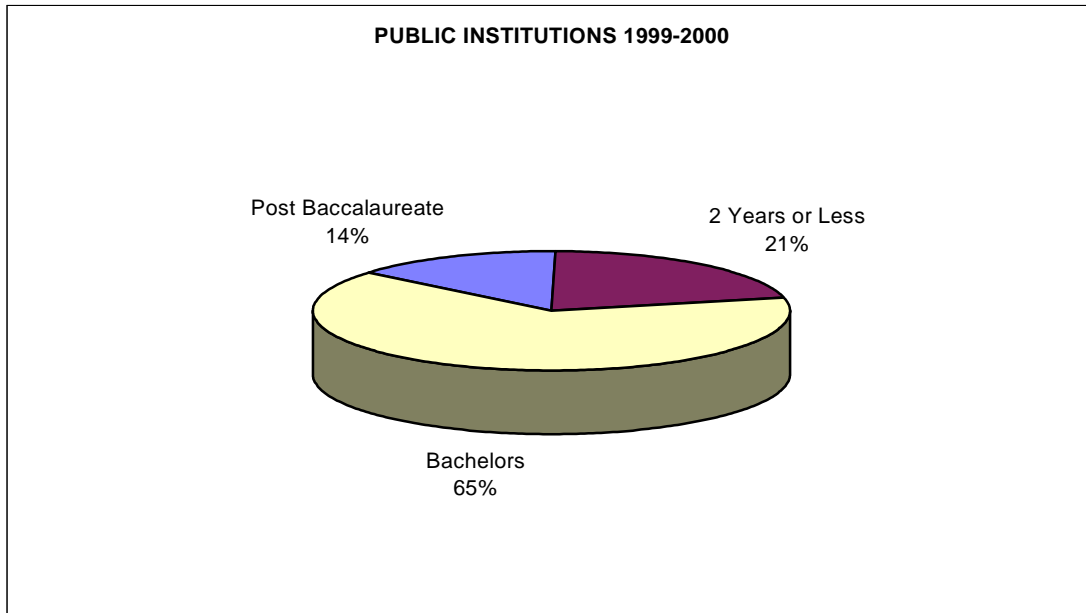
