GENERAL NOTES AND DEFINITIONS:

The following are some general notes and definitions to help clarify data in this profile:

1. By federal definition, a person included in the calculation for “US Citizen” is a US citizen, dual citizen, or permanent resident. Canadian students are international students.
2. An on-campus enrolled student is one whose status is “active student (AS)”. An enrolled student in a Middlebury affiliated study abroad program is one whose status is “Leave Middlebury (LM)”. Similarly, an enrolled student in a non-Middlebury affiliated study away/abroad program is one whose status is “Leave non-Middlebury (LN)”. Entire enrollment simply includes students in all three of these categories.
3. Numbers of students in each class has been derived from the graduation year (grd_yr) parameter in BANNER.
4. Notes on individual tables, charts, and graphs are designed to add further clarification. For instance, though they are “enrolled” this fall, foreign and domestic exchange students have been extracted in many data in this profile as they are short-term visitors to the campus.

I. Middlebury Campus

A. ENROLLMENT

Middlebury, like all colleges, is required by the federal government to report on fall enrollment statistics. These figures are reported annually and appear in college guidebooks and publications. For purposes of the federal government reports, all full-time and part-time Middlebury students are counted, with the exception of students who are on leave (studying abroad or at other institutions). All students taking courses for credits must be reported, including exchange students. The fall enrollment census is taken each year at the end of add-drop and no later than October 15th by requirement of the federal government.

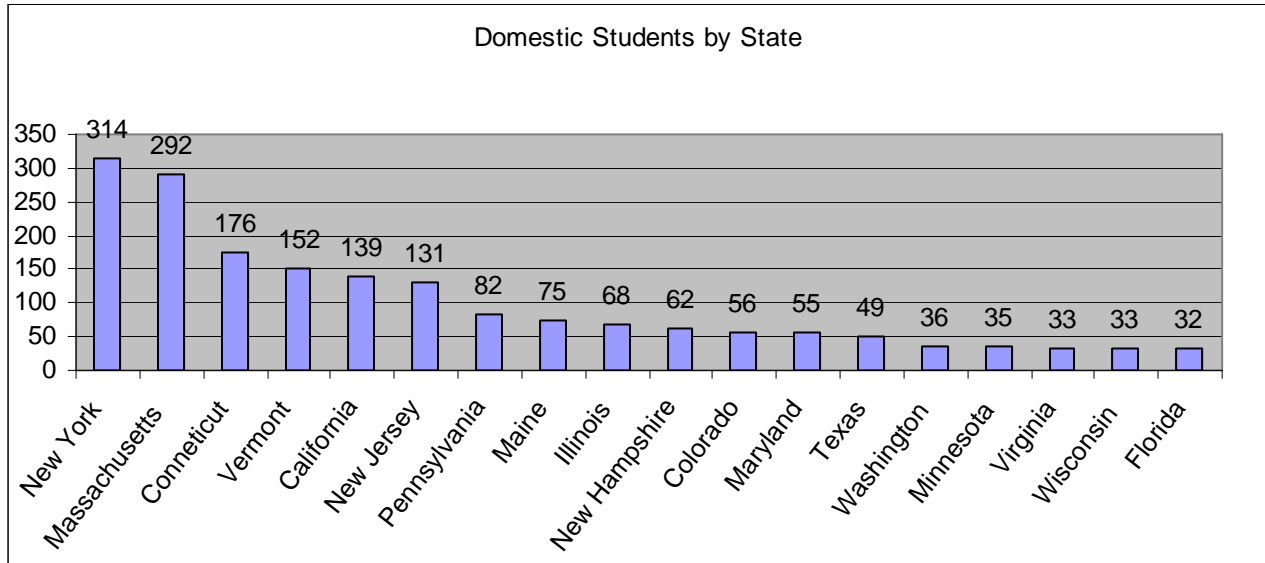

B. WHERE DO OUR STUDENTS COME FROM

Middlebury students (who are not international students or domestic students such as faculty/staff enrolled for credit, teachers education, teaching assistant or Katrina students) come from all 52 states and territories.



Note: This chart does not include foreign exchange or other international students or domestic students such as faculty/staff enrolled for credit, teachers education, teaching assistant or Katrina students.

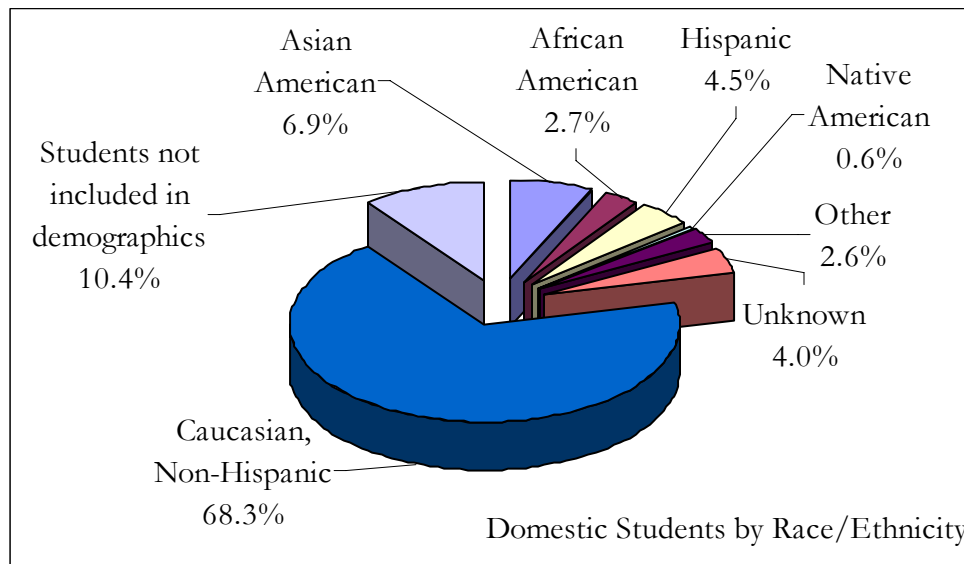

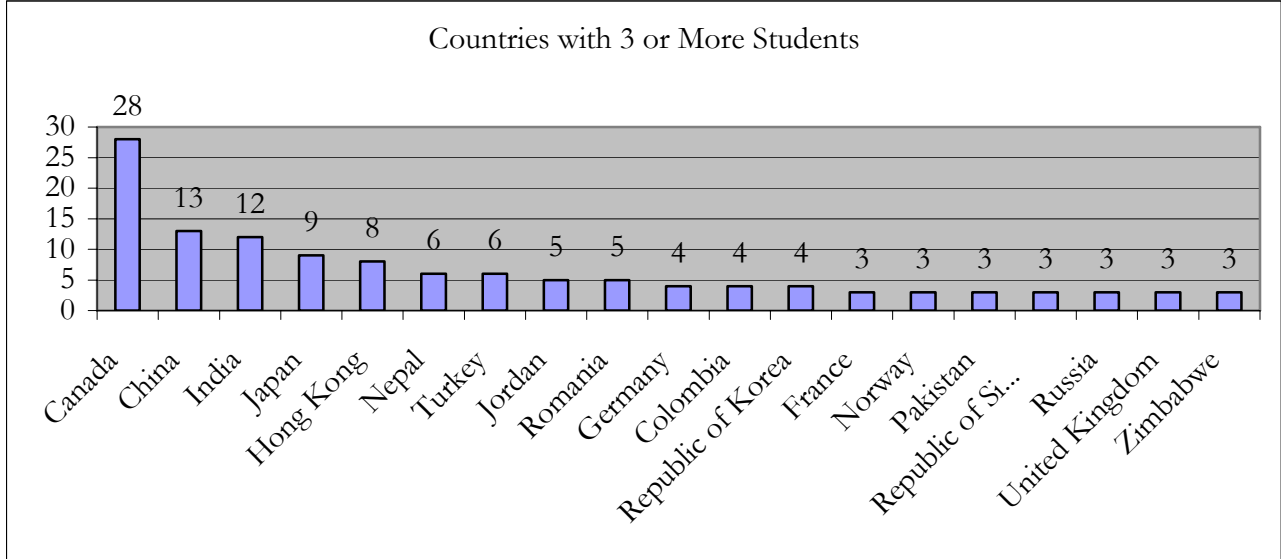

C. INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

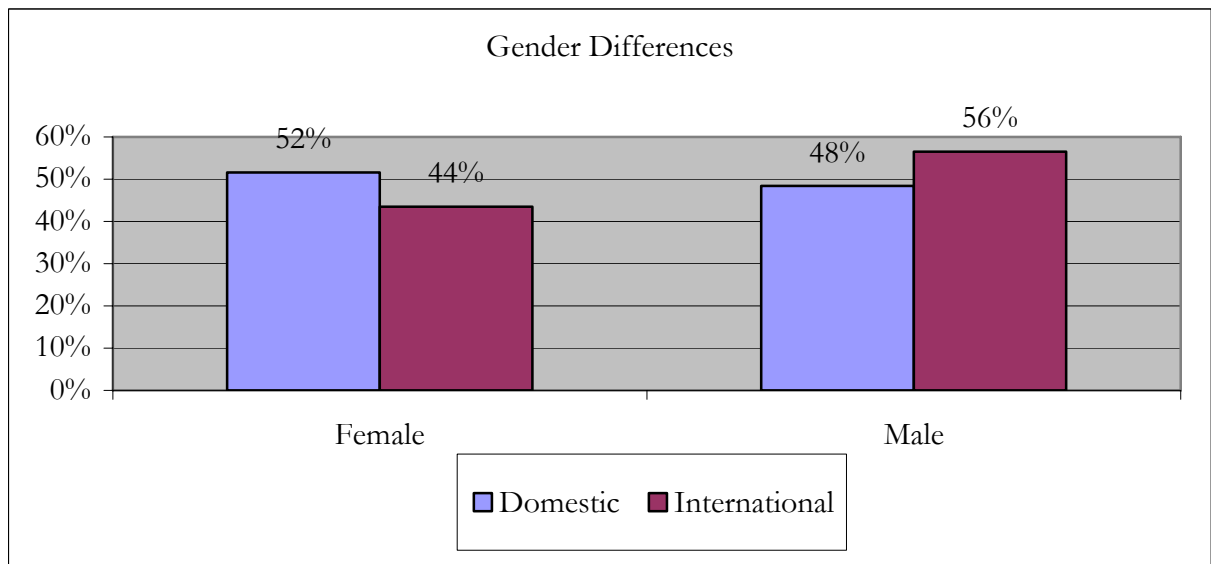
On campus this fall there are 216 international students (8.8% of the on-campus student body) with 64 countries represented. Countries with the most students include:



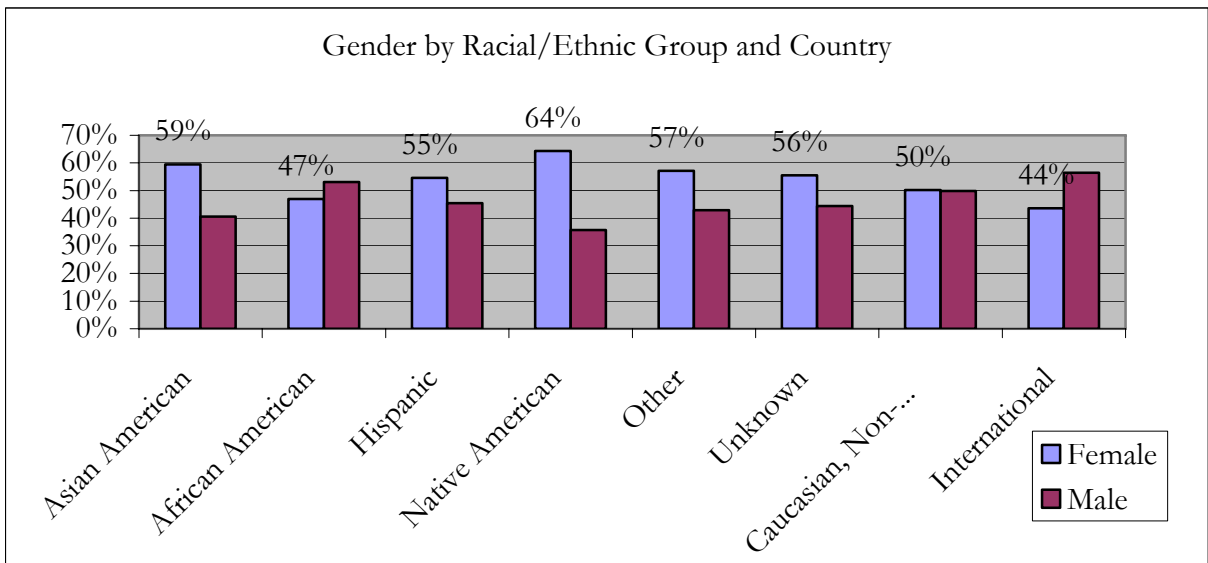

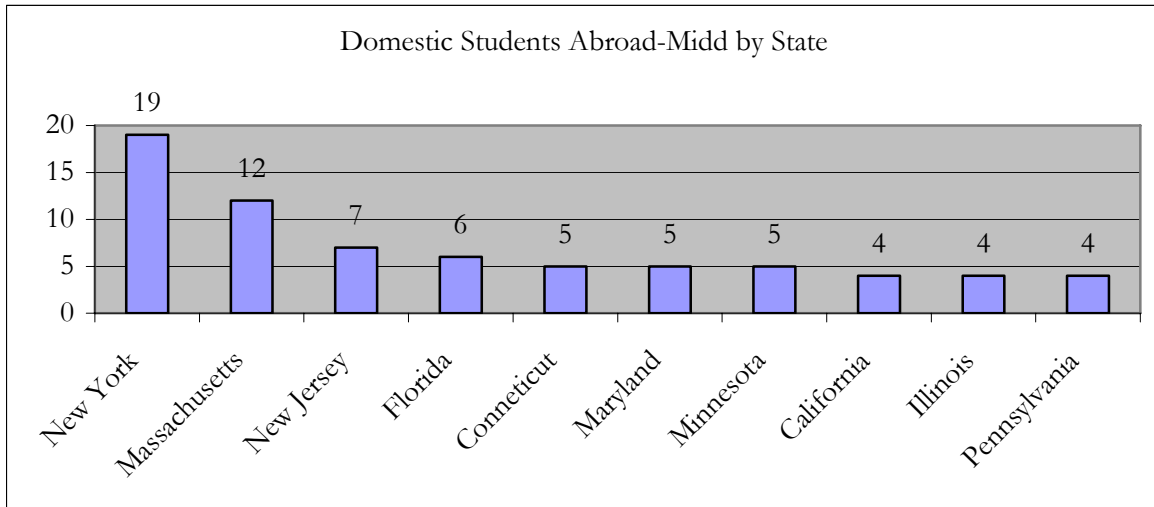

A. ENROLLMENT

A total of 121 Middlebury students are studying abroad in Middlebury programs this fall. This figure includes 83 women and 38 men. In terms of Middlebury students who are international students and are studying abroad this fall, 11 are women and 4 are men.

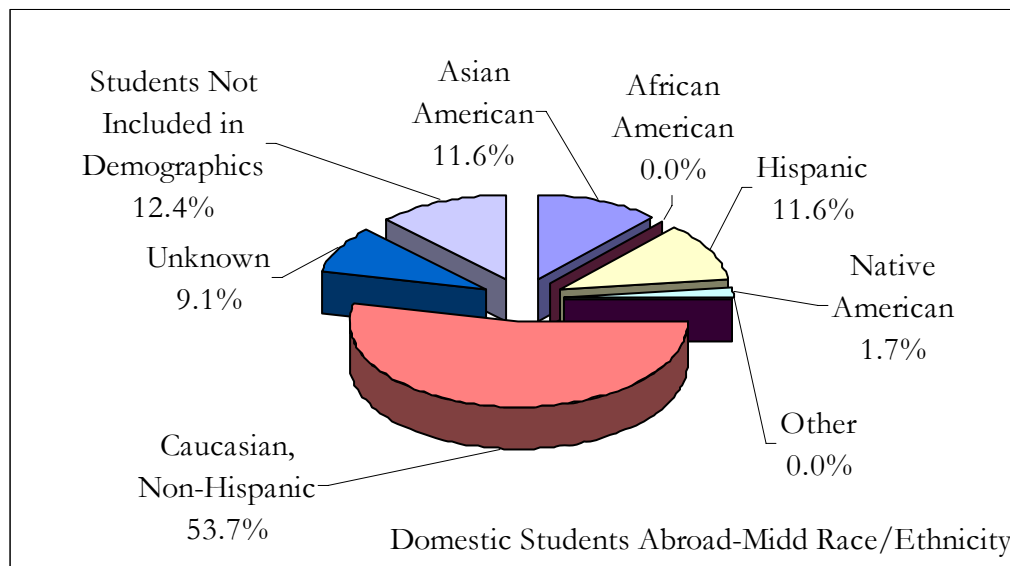

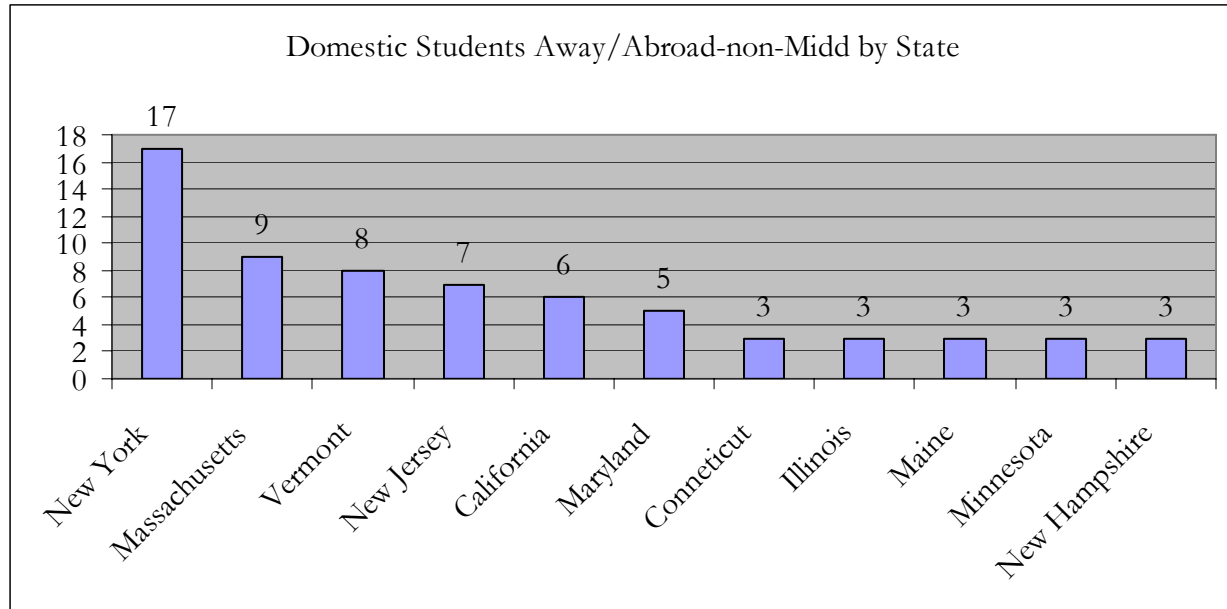

A total of 106 Middlebury students are studying abroad in non-Middlebury programs this fall. This figure includes 70 women and 36 men. In terms of Middlebury students who are international students and are studying abroad this fall, 8 are women and 3 are men.

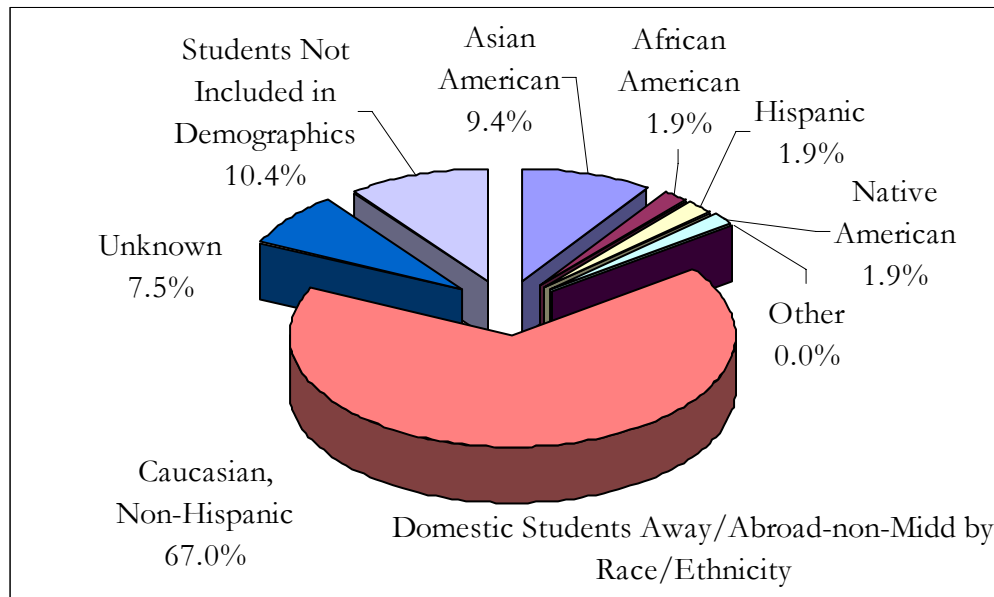

D. WHERE OUR STUDENTS ARE STUDYING

Of the 227 Middlebury students abroad/away this fall, 106 (47%) study through non-Middlebury programs. These figures include 7 students studying away in the United States, namely 4 students studying in Washington, 1 at Woods Hole, 1 at an engineering program at Dartmouth College, and 1 at the Northeastern Three Seas Program.

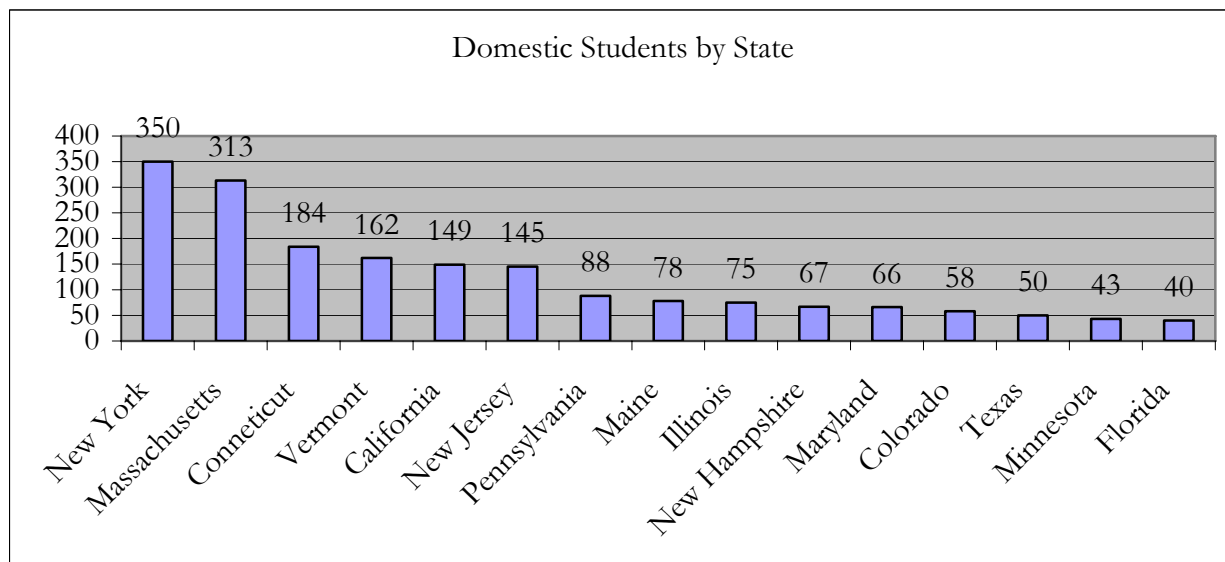

Note: This chart does not include foreign exchange or other international students. In addition, it does not include teaching assistants, teachers education students, or Katrina students.

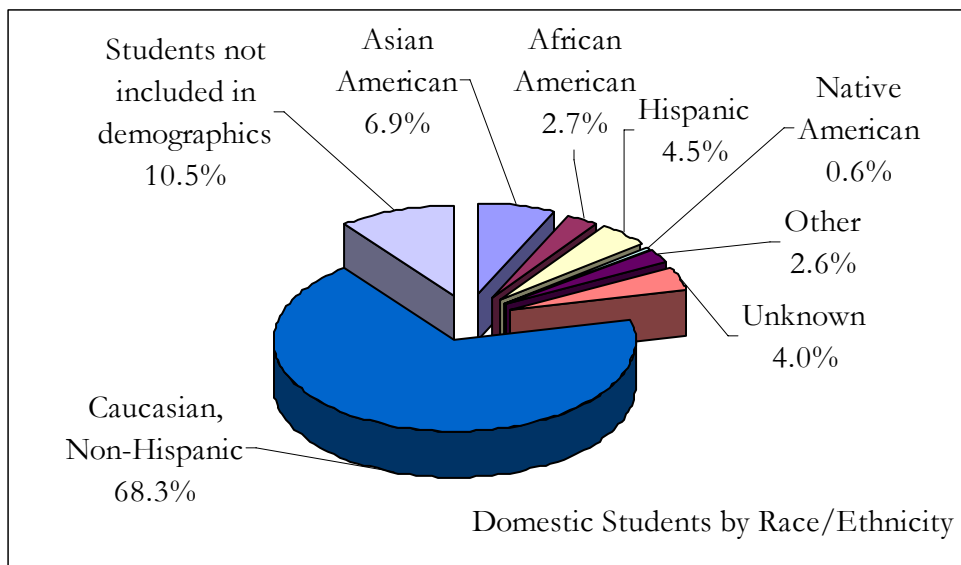

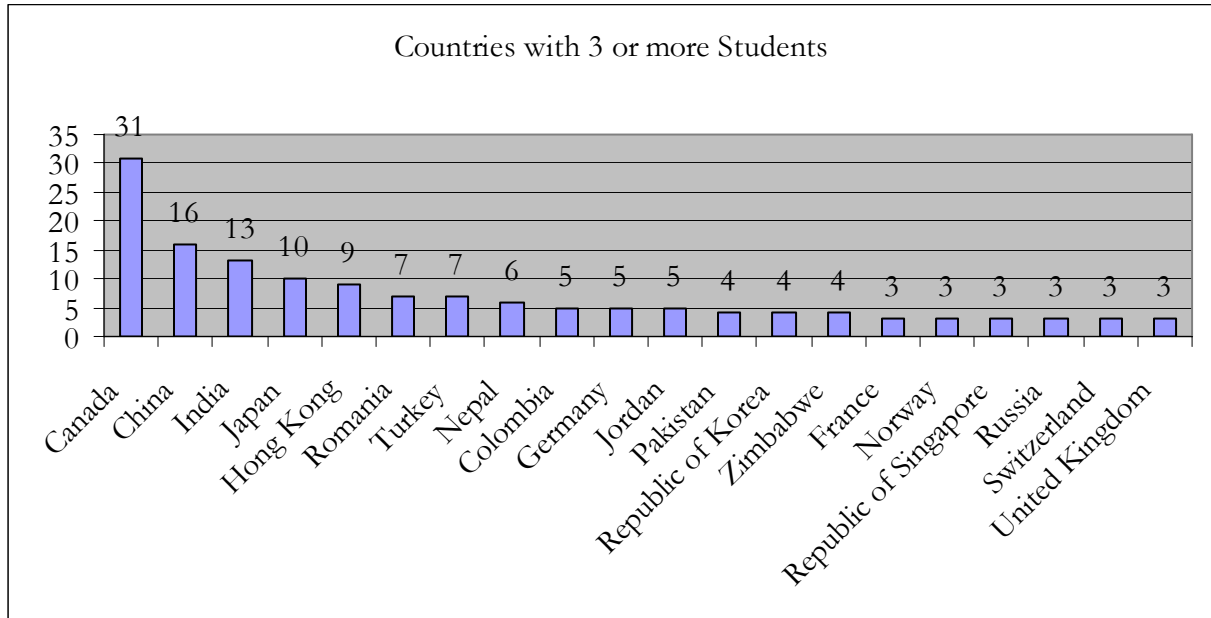

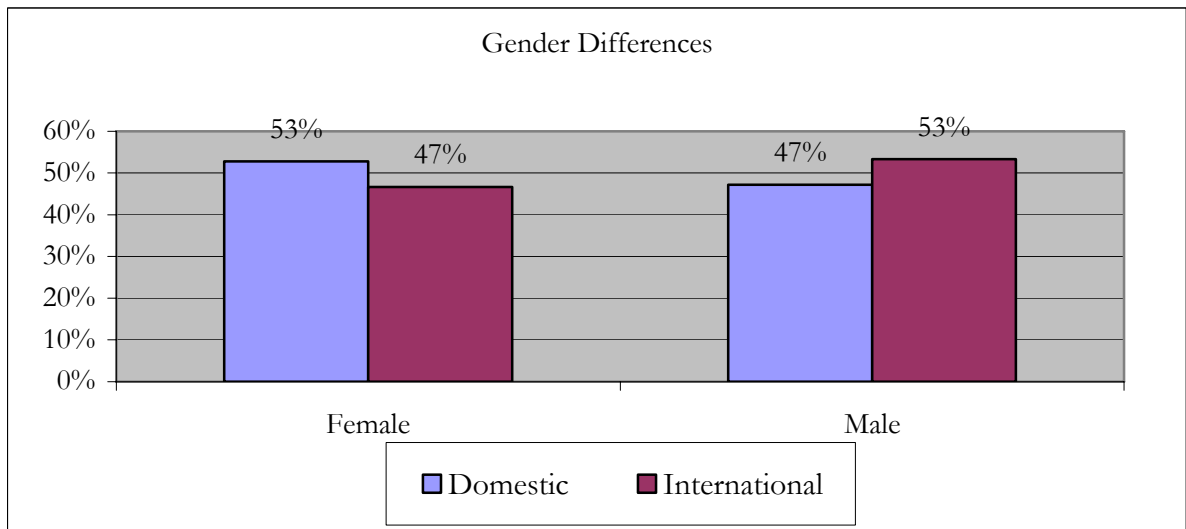
This fall there are 242 international students (approximately 9% of the entire student body) with 66 countries represented. Countries with the most students include:



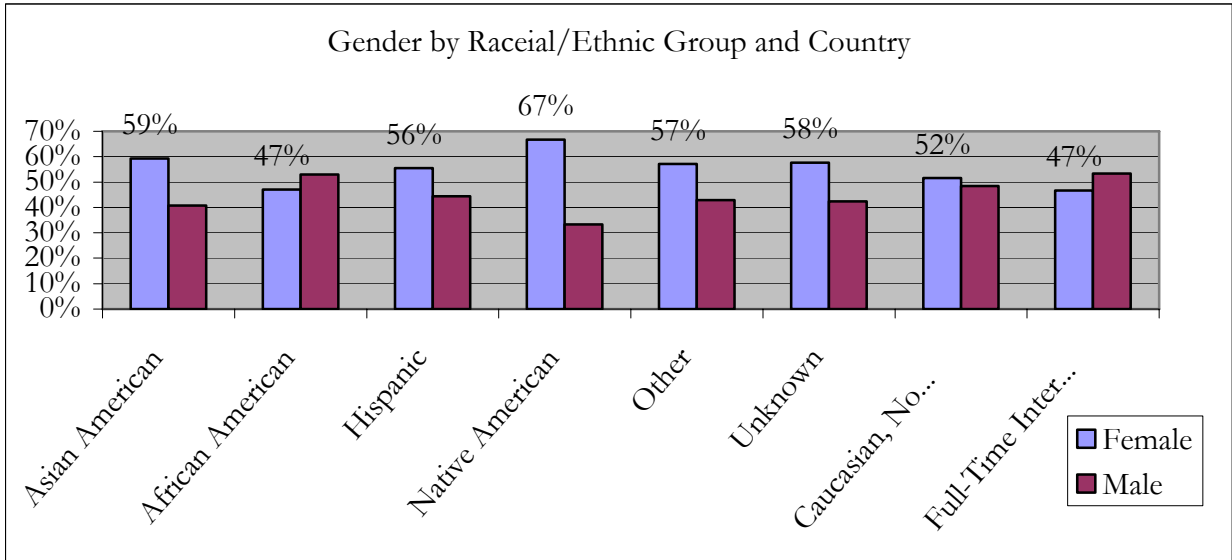
