### A Lively Kickoff: September's Hirschfield Screening Sparks Discussion



We launched the first Hirschfield screening of the year with a bang! Over 150 attendees packed Dana Auditorium to enjoy a collection of short films straight from the Sundance Film Festival. The energy in the room was electric, with the conversation spilling over from the auditorium into our new Media Curation and Exhibition class, taught by Professor Ioana Uricaru. In this course, students are diving into the fascinating world of film festivals. distribution, and behind-thescenes operations experiencing first-hand what it takes to bring films from screen to audience.

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One of the most talked-about films from the screening was *Bug Diner*, a stop-motion animated short by Phoebe Jane Hart. The film, which depicts bugs in a diner experiencing intense emotions and sexual encounters, stirred a polarized response from the audience. Some felt the film leaned too heavily on shock value, while others appreciated the deeper themes at play.

In a follow-up discussion, Graydon Hanson '25 offered some insight into this divide:

"Although I enjoyed the film throughout, people initially thought Bug Diner focused more on its shock factor than any deeper message. In our class, I learned that the filmmaker was channeling her feelings of sexual frustration and isolation while living in a lonely part of the US. Knowing that context added a whole new layer to the film for me, and I found myself appreciating it even more."

Graydon also shared his thoughts on *The Masterpiece*, a Spanish short film by Alex Lora:

"It felt like it was trying a little too hard to be Parasite, and I didn't enjoy that aspect. But many people in the audience loved it because of its commentary on material culture, imperialism, and colonialism. The way the characters existed in their own worlds until they collided was something a lot of people found really impactful."

With weekly video assignments, students get handson experience, learning complex lighting setups and camera techniques in a collaborative environment. In Faking Reality with Jason Mittell, you'll dive deep into the theory and techniques behind hoax media and mockumentaries. This course examines the history. ethics, and cultural impact of media that blur the lines between reality and fiction. For the final project, students can choose to write a critical essay or create their own mockumentary-style piece.
