History in Translation

Since 2020, undergraduates from Middlebury College and International Christian University have collaborated on the translation of primary source documents and interviews detailing the experiences of Japanese Americans living under Executive Order 9066. The Summer 2022 History in Translation program built on these efforts, providing opportunity for students from Japan and students from the United States to gather in a shared space and time to further explore and study this history and its lived impacts, identify and consider how and why our assumptions and perspectives on history conflict (and do not), and to understand how the transformational potential of these historical explorations can

Projects for Peace Grant recipients supported by us

Mohamed Ahmed, an international policy and development student, will be working on his project, Peace Story. Peace Story will be supported by the Kathryn Wasserman Davis Collaborative in Conflict Transformation and will take place in Egypt, Lebanon, Jordan, and Syria—countries with peace-related challenges and high numbers of young people—with a

focus on Syrian refugees in Lebanon. It will encourage 25 participants, ages 18 to 25, to recognize their roles in promoting peace and preventing violent conflict. Ahmed notes in his proposal that youth account for roughly 30 percent of the total population of the Arab region. "Therefore," he says, "engaging Arab youth in peace building and sustainable development could play a significant role in restoring and maintaining stability in the entire region as well as the world. To do so, youth need to incorporate the values and skills of civic education, dialogue, tolerance, and taking
