About the major

International and global education encourages students to transcend the confines of their own backgrounds and upbringing, apprehend the world through others' eyes, and, in the process, become more informed global citizens.

The international and global studies (IGS) program aims at educating majors about regional issues and global themes from multiple perspectives. Students majoring in IGS will choose either a regional or a thematic track and be exposed to the historic, geographical, cultural, political, economic, or environmental dimensions of the region or the theme, and gain a critical perspective of the complexity of local, national, and global issues in the ever changing world.

Reasons you might choose this major

- You understand and appreciate that we live in an increasingly complex and globalized world.
- You want to better understand how societies function within their regions and how they affect the rest of the world.
- You are interested in understanding the region from multiple disciplinary perspectives, and you are interested in global issues.
- You are interested in examining in depth a global theme (security or gender, for example) and in seeing its impact on individuals and society.
- You want to delve deeply into the study of a particular language, have a deep desire to study abroad in a chosen region, and want to achieve a level of fluency sufficient to do academic and professional work.
- You want a solid foundation to approach the world with an informed perspective—one that will lead to any number of career paths and trajectories.

Leadership: Leverage the strengths of others to achieve common goals, and use interpersonal skills to coach and develop others.

Professionalism/Work Ethic: Demonstrate personal accountability and effective work habits.

Global/Intercultural Fluency: Value, respect, and learn from diverse cultures, races, ages, genders, sexual orientations, and religions.

Digital Technology: Leverage existing digital technologies ethically and efficiently to solve problems, complete tasks, and accomplish goals.

Career Management: Identify and articulate one's skills, strengths, knowledge, and experiences relevant to career goals, and identify areas necessary for professional development.
