# **ECOSYSTEM**

Students don't navigate their career journeys alone. At Middlebury, they are surrounded by a community of mentors and partners who help them explore, grow, and take the next step.

#### **ALUMNI CONNECTIONS: STONE POINT CAPITAL**

Middlebury's powerful alumni network came alive when CCI was introduced to Chuck Davis '82, CEO of Stone Point Capital. That single connection led to a dynamic on-campus program in which Stone Point professionals shared insights on private equity and investment strategy with students. The event not only expanded students' understanding of the industry but also forged lasting alumni-student relationships—illustrating how the ecosystem leverages alumni expertise to open doors and give students the confidence to pursue competitive opportunities.

#### SHARED OPPORTUNITIES: NESCAC COLLABORATIONS

In 2025, CCI deepened collaboration with fellow NESCAC institutions through more than 60 shared employer-hosted virtual sessions. Students connected with leading organizations—from Bloomberg and Penguin Random House to the U.S. Department of Commerce and Wood Mackenzie—across fields including healthcare, government, technology, consulting, publishing, and sustainability. The results speak for themselves: students secured seven full-time positions and six internships directly from these sessions. This is the ecosystem in action—strategic partnerships expanding networks, multiplying opportunities, and ensuring Middlebury students are both world-ready and work-ready.

#### PEER BENCHMARKING: LIBERAL ARTS CAREER NETWORK (LACN)

Ecosystems thrive when we learn from others. Charles Caldwell, CCI's Systems and Data Coordinator and co-chair of LACN's benchmarking committee, developed a dashboard capturing eight years of data from 44 peer career centers. The tool tracks student engagement, operating budgets, and staffing levels, showing that Middlebury consistently ranks high in student engagement. These insights have sparked collaboration with other top-performing schools, ensuring we continue to deliver exceptional career education while stewarding resources wisely.

# STRENGTHENING Career Education

CCI embeds career development early and consistently throughout the student experience—helping students build skills, confidence, and professional mindsets that prepare them for life after Middlebury.

#### COMPASS LAB: WHERE CAREER MEETS CURRICULUM

CCI partnered with faculty to integrate career exploration into First-Year Seminars through the Compass Lab. This weekly curriculum connected classroom learning with reflection, skill-building, and life design activities. In 2024–25, Compass Lab reached 17 First Year Seminar sections, giving first years structured opportunities to identify strengths, explore interests, and practice skills for success. Lessons learned will shape how Middlebury bridges academics with career preparation.

#### NATIONAL RECOGNITION FOR INNOVATIVE CURRICULUM

Our Winter Term course "From College to Career," infused with Career Launch lessons, gained national recognition with presentations at both the AAC&U Conference on Learning and Student Success and the National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE). We were excited to share the results achieved reported by students completing the course in Winter 2025:

We remove barriers by expanding funding and partnerships to ensure all students can pursue experiential learning that aligns with their goals.



This year, CCI launched its first internship cohort at the Minneapolis Institute of Art (Mia), a nationally recognized arts institution, known for its large and comprehensive collection of Asian art. Supported by the Robert & Barbara Youngman Asian Internship and Art Acquisition & Conservation Fund, the program provided the Middlebury cohort with eight weeks of immersive, paid experience across curatorial, education, DEI, and library services. Students collaborated with seasoned professionals on projects such as provenance research, exhibition design, K-12 arts education, and communityengaged programming. With structured mentorship and professional development, interns built essential competencies—including cultural fluency and project management—while envisioning their place in the museum field, helping to diversify pathways into the arts.

### FUNDING FUTURES: INTERNSHIPS WITHOUT FINANCIAL BARRIERS

Through CCI's robust internship funding program, students—regardless of financial circumstance—are able to pursue high-impact, career-advancing opportunities. In 2024, we awarded more than \$1,000,000 in internship funding, enabling hundreds of Middlebury students to participate in unpaid or underpaid summer and winter term internships across the globe. From grassroots nonprofits to cutting-edge research labs, these experiences helped students build skills, explore career paths, and expand professional networks—without the weight of financial strain.

#### PATHWAYS TO GLOBAL AFFAIRS AND CONFLICT TRANSFORMATION: DC TREK

This year's **Global Affairs and Conflict Transformation Trek to Washington, DC**, led by Tim Mosehauer, removed geographic barriers by connecting Rohatyn Global Scholars and Fellows with Middlebury alumni shaping policy, media, and public service in Washington, D.C. Students visited organizations such as the Brookings Institution, Department of State, and NPR, immersing themselves in the work of think tanks, government agencies, and advocacy groups. At each stop, alumni shared personal stories and networking opportunities, expanding students' professional circles and helping them envision future paths in the nation's capital and beyond.





#### **MENTORING THE MIDD WAY**

Alumni are helping students find their paths.

When JD Ballard '15 was a student at Middlebury, he landed his first job through an alum. So did Meegan Moszynski '01. Today, both are giving back as MiddMentors, part of Midd2Midd, the College's 11,000-member networking and mentoring platform.

Through MiddMentors, alumni are paired with students to provide career advice, connections, and encouragement. This fall, CCI created 105 new matches, continuing to grow the program's impact.

He guided him through applications, offered introductions at Nomura, and helped him secure a competitive internship that led to a full-time offer. # STORIES From the Field

#### CCI FACILITATES CAREER SUPPORT SERIES FOR MIDDLEBURY ALUMNI

With growing uncertainty and diminished job security in fields such as government, international development, and technology—impacted by both geopolitical events and the rapid implementation of Al—many Middlebury alumni are facing career disruptions or feeling that their jobs are at risk.

In response, CCI launched an alumni career support initiative in May to help address these challenges and provide resources to alumni of the College, Institute, and Schools. Highlights include:

- **Midd Helping Midd Job Board**: An alumni job sharing board hosted on the Midd2Midd platform. Alumni are invited to share paid jobs and openings sourced from their organizations and networks.
- **Middlebury and Williams Alumni Happy Hour** in Washington, DC, drawing more than 60 participants for networking.
- **"Your Next Giant Reset: A Career Comeback Guide"** webinar with Leilani Brown '93, attended by 271 alumni.
- "Introducing Yourself: A Masterclass in Talking About YOU" webinar with Jean Card '94 and Leilani Brown '93, drawing 185 attendees.
- "Networking That Actually Works—Even When the Future Feels Uncertain" webinar with David Han, engaging 132 participants.

Together, we continue to build a supportive network that empowers each other's professional journeys. CCI is grateful for the collaboration and support of *Middlebury in DC*, the Alumni Office, David Han of the Williams DC Regional Association, and the Middlebury Alumni Association.

# EXPANDING Global Perspectives

This summer, **Drew McStay '27**, with 13 Middlebury students, participated in the **diiVe consulting program** in Cape Town, South Africa, working with Reach Digital Health, a global nonprofit delivering digital health solutions in underserved communities. As part of an international team, Drew helped design a strategic plan to strengthen collaboration and culture within Reach's fully remote workforce—creating systems to foster conversation, reinforce values, and support teamwork across time zones.

"Culture is often invisible but incredibly powerful," Drew reflected. "It shapes how people show up, how they relate to one another, and how resilient a company can be when things get tough."

Through the experience, Drew gained skills in organizational strategy, cross-cultural communication, and conflict transformation—tools that will serve him in tackling complex, real-world challenges.

## GUIDED BY EXPERIENCE: ALUMNI MENTORSHIP IN ACTION


This summer, **Katie Bruno '26**, an Environmental Studies–Biology major with a Psychology minor, worked as a Seasonal Research Assistant at the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station. Supporting research with **Dr. Andrew Whittinghill '06**, she explored the connections between urban farming and ecological systems, focusing on nutrient leaching and sustainable practices.

At the station's annual Plant Science Day, Katie engaged with more than a thousand visitors, sharing research with urban growers and home gardeners. "I was most surprised about how receptive the public is to research like this," she reflected. "It was exciting to see how invested people are in agriculture."

The experience strengthened Katie's confidence in both lab and fieldwork, sharpened her problem-solving skills, and affirmed her passion for applying science to community impact.
